

For if a law had been given that was able to give life, then righteousness would certainly be by the law. 22 But the Scripture has imprisoned everything under sin's power,[q] so that the promise by faith in Jesus Christ might be given to those who believe. 23 Before this faith came, we were confined under the law, imprisoned until the coming faith was revealed. 24 The law, then, was our guardian[r] until Christ, so that we could be justified by faith. 25 But since that faith has come, we are no longer under a guardian, 26 for you are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus.

Galatians 4:4-5

- 4 When the time came to completion, God sent His Son, born of a woman, born under the law,
- 5 to redeem those under the law, so that we might receive adoption as sons

- 3 Again I testify to every man who gets himself circumcised that he is obligated to keep the entire law.
- 4 You who are trying to be justified by the law are alienated from Christ; you have fallen from grace.

13 For you were called to be free, brothers; only don't use this freedom as an opportunity for the flesh, but serve one another through love. 14 For the entire law is fulfilled in one statement: Love your neighbor as yourself.[a] 15 But if you bite and devour one another, watch out, or you will be consumed by one another.

The Spirit versus the Flesh

16 I say then, walk by the Spirit and you will not carry out the desire of the flesh. 17 For the flesh desires what is against the Spirit, and the Spirit desires what is against the flesh; these are opposed to each other, so that you don't do what you want. 18 But if you are led by the Spirit, you are not under the law.

Adventists butchered 4,000 other Adventists in Rwanda with machetes. This equals the death toll of the Spanish Inquisition.

But these murderous, blood-soaked clowns took Saturday off!

You DID know that murder is specifically prohibited in Genesis 9, in the covenant of Noah? How long do you think Adventists will continue to lie that murder would be okay without the Ten Commandments?

But even the Ten Commandments cannot stop Adventists from murdering other Adventists, as they did in the Rwanda Genocide:

"The answer to this plea came the next day, Sabbath morning, at approximately 9 o'clock am. The attackers advanced toward the church from all sides chanting "Eliminate the Tutsis!" They worked methodically with guns and machetes, moving from church to school to hospital. The victims, weak from food and water deprivation, mounted a feeble defense with bricks and stones. But they were overcome with little effort. The killers, keen to spare bullets, only paused when the physical exertion of chopping and spearing demanded rest. By evening, mop-up operations had begun: tear gas was fired to cause any living Tutsis among the corpses to cry out. The attackers then made sure these joined the rest.

In the end, Mugonero may have been the worst single massacre in the entire 1994 genocide. In a single day almost all of the 3,000 Tutsis who had gathered at the Adventist mission were slain, some 2,000 inside the Seventh-day Adventist church building itself. The bloodstains were no longer visible on the walls and floor when I visited Mugonero one week ago. The church is in fact still being used as an active place of worship. Near the entrance to the Mugonero high school there is, however, a small building with stacks of machete-hacked skulls as a memorial to what happened here more than 15 years ago.

Several months after the attack, in a short interview published in the Review, J. J. Nortey, then president of the African-Indian Ocean Division, said that as many as 99 percent of all Adventist workers in the Mugonero region—among them pastors, hospital personnel, and mission employees—were killed. In total, an estimated 10,000 Seventh-day Adventists died in Rwanda in barely three months.

Even more alarming in the aftermath of the genocide, however, is the fact that Adventists were not only among the victims. On February 19, 2003, Pastor Ntakirutimana was sentenced by the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda to 10 years in prison for complicity in crimes against humanity. The Tribunal found that Pastor Ntakirutimana, together with his son Gerard—the head doctor at the Adventist Mugonero Hospital—aided and abetted Hutu killers, going so far as to order the removal of church roofing so that Tutsis would have nowhere to hide.

But the Ntakirutimanas were not the only Adventists who sided with the killers. In regions with large numbers of Seventh-day Adventists, the killings were just as bad as in the rest of the country. "[T]here were church-going people seen in the mobs, cheering...those who did the killings," Nortey reported. Today, jails in Rwanda hold large numbers of Adventists who have been implicated in the genocide. According to one high level church official I spoke with at the Union office in Kigali, not only Adventist lay members but numerous Adventist pastors have been convicted by Rwanda's village level gacaca courts for their role in genocidal crimes against humanity. During the genocide, he told me, some Adventists maintained their Adventism by scrupulously resting from killing on Sabbaths."

Levý reported that while traveling in war-torn Burundi (which borders Rwanda and is comprised of the same Hutu and Tutsi tribes) he asked a taxi driver to take him to the southern part of the country. The driver consented, but on one condition: the trip had to be on Saturday. "Why on Saturday?" Levý writes. "Because the 'genocidal aggressors', those Hutu of the National Liberation Front, of which the whole country continues to repeat by memory abominable crimes... they are also good Christians, mostly of Adventist confession, who don't smoke, don't drink, arrive at the villages singing loud songs and consider Saturday a sacred day, dedicated to prayer, in which one must not kill."

But Sunday is the day on which we all hold our common assembly, because it is the first day on which God, having wrought a change in the darkness and matter, made the world; and Jesus Christ our Saviour on the same day rose from the dead. 

The bloodstains were no longer visible on the walls and floor when I visited Mugonero one week ago. The church is in fact still being used as an active place of worship. Near the entrance to the Mugonero high school there is, however, a small building with stacks of machete-hacked skulls as a memorial to what happened here more than 15 years ago.

Several months after the attack, in a short interview published in the Review, J. J. Nortey, then president of the African-Indian Ocean Division, said that as many as 99 percent of all Adventist workers in the Mugonero region—among them pastors, hospital personnel, and mission employees—were killed. In total, an estimated 10,000 Seventh-day Adventists died in Rwanda in barely three months.

Even more alarming in the aftermath of the genocide, however, is the fact that Adventists were not only among the victims. On February 19, 2003, Pastor Ntakirutimana was sentenced by the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda to 10 years in prison for complicity in crimes against humanity. The Tribunal found that Pastor Ntakirutimana, together with his son Gerard—the head doctor at the Adventist Mugonero Hospital—aided and abetted Hutu killers, going so far as to order the removal of church roofing so that Tutsis would have nowhere to hide.

But the Ntakirutimanas were not the only Adventists who sided with the killers. In regions with large numbers of Seventh-day Adventists, the killings were just as bad as in the rest of the country. "[T]here were church-going people seen in the mobs, cheering...those who did the killings," Nortey reported. Today, jails in Rwanda hold large numbers of Adventists who have been implicated in the genocide. According to one high level church official I spoke with at the Union office in Kigali, not only Adventist lay members but numerous Adventist pastors have been convicted by Rwanda's village level gacaca courts for their role in genocidal crimes against humanity. During the genocide, he told me, some Adventists maintained their Adventism by scrupulously resting from killing on Sabbaths.

Levý reported that while traveling in war-torn Burundi (which borders Rwanda and is comprised of the same Hutu and Tutsi tribes) he asked a taxi driver to take him to the southern part of the country. The driver consented, but on one condition: the trip had to be on Saturday. "Why on Saturday?" Levý writes. "Because the 'genocidal aggressors', those Hutu of the National Liberation Front, of which the whole country continues to repeat by memory abominable crimes... they are also good Christians, mostly of Adventist confession, who don't smoke, don't drink, arrive at the villages singing loud songs and consider Saturday a sacred day, dedicated to prayer, in which one must not kill."





"Parables are true-to-life, but hypothetical, illustrative stories.

The names of specific individuals are never given in them, but here the names of three men are given; Lazarus, Abraham, and Moses. Also mentioned are the "prophets" who were also real people. ("Moses and the prophets" is a general term for the whole Old Testament that refers to its human authors).

It does not have the normal form of a parable with an introduction, analogy story, and application. Instead it is in the form of the narration of a real-life story given for the purpose of illustration.

It does not use the principle of comparison in a way that is characteristic of parables.

The discussion between the rich man and Abraham is not consistent with the parabolic style found in the Scriptures. It seems obvious that in relating this particular story when He did, the Lord Jesus was using a real-life account that many of those listening to Him that day could readily relate to it because they actually knew, or at least knew of, the two men involved. The rich man's brothers may have even been in the audience."





You see, God is on trial here to see if He really is loving like He claims to be, or if He is, in fact, a despotic dictator out for His own glory and selfish ambition. If He really did keep sentient beings alive to torture them for eternity, what would that tell you about God? You really don't care what God does? – if He is in fact loving or not?

Beyond this, you don't seem to be carefully considering everything that the Bible has to say about "soul sleep." The Bible actually supports the idea that the wicked do not live for eternity in the torments of Hell, but that their souls actually die. Ezekiel points out that, "The soul who sins shall die." (Ezekiel 18:20). Notice here that it isn't just the body of the wicked person that dies – it's the very soul of the person. It was Satan who first spoke the lie in Eden that no one really dies (Genes is 3:4). The reality is, of course, that if the soul can come into existence it can be taken out of existence as well. Only God alone possesses immortality inherent within Himself (1 Timothy 6:16). Everyone else is dependent upon God for life. Your soul is not inherently eternal or immortal – and neither is mine or anyone else's aside from God. God made our souls and God can destroy them just as easily - which would be much more loving than to torture a living soul forever without any end.

Even the souls of the righteous sleep during death until the resurrection of the just – according to the Bible. What's the point of a resurrection if all the dead righteous are already living happily in Heaven? According to the Bible, even King David is "both dead and buried, and his sepulcher is with us unto this day. For David is not ascended into the heavens." (Acts 2:29, 34). The Bible does not place David's soul in Heaven – and even David claims that the dead cannot praise God – but are "silent" (Ps. 117:17). "There is no work or device or knowledge or wisdom in the grave where you are going." (Ecclesiastes 9:10).

I mean, after a while it is hard to actually ignore everything that the Bible says about soul sleep... for both the righteous and the wicked. This is actually a good thing if you think about it. If you read what Paul says about death in 1 Thessalonians 4:13-18, it is quite clear that he does not believe that the righteous who have already died have been enjoying heaven while the righteous still alive on Earth have been struggling the whole time. He describes those who have died as having "fallen asleep" to be later woken up with the "voice of the archangel and with the trumpet call of God". It is at this point that the "dead in Christ will rise" to be caught up with those who are still alive on Earth when "together" they will all "be with the Lord forever" starting at that point. The souls of the dead do not come back from enjoying Heaven the whole time to be given back their bodies. Rather, they are woken up and everyone is given a new glorified body together – and together they all begin their lives, at the same time, with the Lord.

That's a far far better picture of God compared to the popular notion that the soul never sleeps – for either the wicked or the righteous... at least it seems like that to me. I can love a God like this...



To be honest, however, I'm most surprised by your taking on the belief in eternal Hell where God actually tortures people for all eternity. Even a growing number of evangelical Christian theologians are starting to recognize that this concept simply isn't Biblical – that it does, in fact, paint God as an evil tyrant. Consider, for example, the extensive work of the Church of Christ theologian Edward Fudge (also an attorney). He wrote an extensive scholarly work on the topic of the Bible's position on Hell. The Title of his book is, "The Fire that Consumes" (or watch the movie about his work entitled, "Hell and Mr. Fudge). Or, if you'd rather read an interesting review instead, consider reading Dr. Claude Mariottini's reviews (He has been a Professor of the Old Testament at Northern Baptist Seminary since 1988). Both of these professors point out that the view that the human soul is immortal comes from Greek philosophy – originating with Plato's view of the soul. Christians in the second and third centuries adopted the Greek view in order to better dialogue with their world. Since this time, many Christians have come to believe that the soul is immortal, that the soul lives forever after death. However, this view contradicts the teachings of Scriptures, for the Bible affirms that only God is immortal: "It is [God] alone who has immortality (1 Timothy 6:16). When the Bible says that "the soul who sins is the one who will die" (Ezekiel 18:20), the Bible is already affirming that "souls" die. You can read more at:



There are just a couple problems with your claim here. First, the date of Easter Day is usually the first Sunday after the first Full Moon occurring on or after the March equinox. This is a problem because Polycarp was martyred toward the end of February – well before Easter.

According to the letter, "The Martyrdom of Polycarp" by the Smyrnaeans:

"On the day of the preparation, at the hour of dinner, there came out pursuers and horsemen" and Polycarp was killed "on the day of the great Sabbath (The Martyrdom of Polycarp, Bishop of Smyrna, Verses 7.1 & 8.1. Charles H. Hoole's 1885 translation. © 2001 Peter Kirby).

The use of these two expressions ("day of the preparation" and "the day of the great Sabbath") indicates that those in Polycarp's area were still keeping the Sabbath in the latter portion of the 2nd century. Otherwise, since Asia Minor (including Smyrna) was a Gentile area, the terms "preparation" and "great Sabbath" would not have been relevant.

William Cave wrote "... the Sabbath or 'Saturday' (for so the word sabbatum is constantly used in the writings of the fathers, when speaking of it as it relates to Christians) was held by them in great veneration, and especially in the Eastern parts honoured with all the public solemnities of religion. This is plain, not only from some passages in Ignatius and Clemens' Constitutions, but from writers of more unquestionable credit and authority. Athanasius, bishop of Alexandria, tells us that they assembled on Saturdays... to worship Jesus Christ, the Lord of the Sabbath." - Cave, Primitive Christianity: or the Religion of the Ancient Christians in the First Ages of the Gospel. 1840, revised edition by H. Cary. Oxford, London, pp. 84–85).

Consider also other references to the regular *custom* of Polycarp to worship on the Sabbath:

"And on the Sabbath, when prayer had been made long time on bended knee, he, as was his custom, got up to read; and every eye was fixed upon him..." And on the following Sabbath he said; 'Hear ye my exhortation, beloved children of God..." Thus speaking in this way from time to time, and being persistent in his teaching, he edified and saved both himself and his hearers. (Pionius, Life of Polycarp (1889) from J. B. Lightfoot, The Apostolic Fathers, vol. 3.2, pp.488-506)



The Apostolic Constitutions or Constitutions of the Holy Apostles (Latin: Constitutiones Apostolorum) is a Christian collection of eight treatises which belongs the Church Orders, a genre of early Christian literature, that offered authoritative "apostolic" prescriptions on moral conduct, liturgy and Church organization. The work can be dated from 375 to 380 AD. The provenance is usually regarded as Syria, probably Antioch. Of the Apostolical Constitutions, Guericke's Church History says:

"This is a collection of ecclesiastical statutes purporting to be the work of the apostolic age, but in reality formed gradually in the second, third, and fourth centuries, and is of much value in reference to the history of polity, and Christian archaeology generally." - Ancient Church, p. 212.

Here are a few passages relevant to the Ten Commandments and the keeping of the Sabbath as holy:

"Have before thine eyes the fear of God, and always remember the ten commandments of God, - to love the one and only Lord God with all thy strength; to give no heed to idols, or any other beings, as being lifeless gods, or irrational beings or demons. Consider the manifold workmanship of God, which received its beginning through Christ. Thou shalt observe the Sabbath, on account of Him who ceased from his work of creation, but ceased not from his work of providence: it is a rest for meditation of the law, not for idleness of the hands...

O Lord Almighty, thou hast created the world by Christ, and hast appointed the Sabbath in memory thereof, because that on that day thou hast made us rest from our works, for the meditation upon thy laws. ...

Thou didst give them the law or decalogue, which was pronounced by thy voice and written with thy hand. Thou didst enjoin the observation of the Sabbath, not affording them an occasion of idleness, but an opportunity of piety, for their knowledge of thy power, and the prohibition of evils; having limited them as within an holy circuit for the sake of doctrine, for the rejoicing upon the seventh period...

On this account he permitted men every Sabbath to rest, that so no one might be willing to send one word out of his mouth in anger on the day of the Sabbath. For the Sabbath is the ceasing of the creation, the completion of the world, the inquiry after laws, and the grateful praise to God for the blessings he has bestowed upon men.

I had a rather comical-epiphany debating two separate Adventists on two drastically-different Early Church leaders: Agabus (Acts of the Apostles) and Polycarp (second Century). Leave it to Adventists to relentlessly-interpret EVERYTHING in the Early Church in support of their dishonest sophistry of the Saturn's-Day fetish and to buttress their ridiculous False prophet. Please bear with me. This is a long one.

First, what did Jesus promise us in his Sermon on the Mount? Did he promise us that we would be prophets, or there would BE prophets? Did he mention the Sabbath? The answer to both questions is a resounding "NO!" What DID he promise? Matthew 5

10 Blessed are those who are persecuted because of righteousness, for theirs is the kingdom of heaven.

11 "Blessed are you when people insult you, persecute you and falsely say all kinds of evil against you because of me. 12 Rejoice and be glad, because great is your reward in heaven, for in the same way they persecuted the prophets who were before you."

And in Matthew 16, Jesus AGAIN stressed this same theme: he was NOT a prophet, nor did he teach his disciples that they would be prophets. They would be martyrs. And his Prophecy was accurately fulfilled. All of the Apostles but John were brutally-martyed:

"13 When Jesus came to the region of Caesarea Philippi, he asked his disciples, "Who do people say the Son of Man is?"

14 They replied, "Some say John the Baptist; others say Elijah; and still others, Jeremiah or one of the prophets."

15 "But what about you?" he asked. "Who do you say I am?"

16 Simon Peter answered, "You are the Messiah, the Son of the living God."

17 Jesus replied, "Blessed are you, Simon son of Jonah, for this was not revealed to you by flesh and blood, but by my Father in heaven. 18 And I tell you that you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of Hades will not overcome it. 19 I will give you the keys of the kingdom of heaven; whatever you bind on earth will be[d] bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth will be[e] loosed in heaven." 20 Then he ordered his disciples not to tell anyone that he was the Messiah.

21 From that time on Jesus began to explain to his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and suffer many things at the hands of the elders, the chief priests and the teachers of the law, and that he must be killed and on the third day be raised to life.

22 Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him. "Never, Lord!" he said. "This shall never happen to you!"

23 Jesus turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me; you do not have in mind the concerns of God, but merely human concerns."

24 Then Jesus said to his disciples, "Whoever wants to be my disciple must deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. 25 For whoever wants to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for me will find it. 26 What good will it be for someone to gain the whole world, yet forfeit their soul? Or what can anyone give in exchange for their soul? 27 For the Son of Man is going to come in his Father's glory with his angels, and then he will reward each person according to what they have done."

In both instances, Jesus promised MARTYRDOM. Not that the Apostles would be Prophets. Nor that they would enjoy luxurious and restful Saturday afternoon naps. He promised them that they would be tortured and killed.

Paul's speech is significant, given the location and the content of his sermon. One of the "inside jokes" of his profound rhetoric was his reliance on an absurd Greek didactic hexameter poem. Paul quoted Epimenides of Knossos, who was a semi-mythical Greek seer and philosopher-poet. He supposedly fell asleep for fifty-seven years in a Cretan cave sacred to Zeus. He awoke with the gift of prophecy, according to Greek legend.

Pausanias reports that when Epimenides died, his skin was found to be covered with tattoos. The Tattoos were the entire corpus of his poetic output. Only slaves could have tattoos in Ancient Greece, and Epimenides was not a slave. It is thought to be an emblem of self-sacrifice and resurrection, since his poetry was carefully copied and written down, by those entrusted with lovingly preparing his corpse for burial, under the reformed Athenian funerary law initiated by Solon. His tattooed skin was preserved and worshiped by the Spartans.

The only "prophet" Paul quoted was Epimenides, to scornfully-demonstrate to the Greeks on Mars Hill what they would NOT become by following Christ: a ridiculous fairy-tale "prophet." He did not quote any Hebrew Prophet or make a single mention of the Hebrew law! Only a ridiculous Greek "prophet" with a fake "Resurrection," held up to scorn and ridicule.

The location of his speech is significant, given the massive memorial to the Martyrs of the Battle of Marathon, located at the base of Mars Hill. I quote from the "other Gettysburg Address," given by Edward Everett:

"Such were the tokens of respect required to be paid at Athens to the memory of those who had fallen in the cause of their country. For those alone who fell at Marathon a peculiar honor was reserved. As the battle fought upon that immortal field was distinguished from all others in Grecian history for its influence over the fortunes of Hellas,—as it depended upon the event of that day whether Greece should live, a glory and a light to all coming time, or should expire, like the meteor of a moment; so the honors awarded to its martyr-heroes were such as were bestowed by Athens on no other occasion. They alone of all her sons were entombed upon the spot which they had forever rendered famous. Their names were inscribed upon ten pillars erected upon the monumental tumulus which covered their ashes (where, after six hundred years, they were read by the traveller Pausanias), and although the columns, beneath the hand of time and barbaric violence, have long since disappeared, the venerable mound still marks the spot where they fought and fell,—

"That battle-field where Persia's victim-horde

First bowed beneath the brunt of Hellas' sword."

Paul specifically mentioned Jesus's Resurrection, which featured 500 eyewitnesses unlike the comical fairy tale of the Greek "prophet," hinting that the Greeks could expect to become Martyrs for Jesus of they agreed with Paul. He made no mention of the Sabbath or the Mosaic Law. And he scornfully-ridiculed a Greek "prophet."

Adventists insist that Agabus was a Prophet who was a typology of Ellen White, since Acts mentions two of his prophecies that came true. But Agabus was an Apostle who was with the 12 Apostles in the upper room at the Day of Pentecost. The Office of Apostle is an Old Testament Prophet "on steroids." Notably, no Adventist has unwisely claimed that Ellen White was an Apostle. And most importantly, Agabus was an outstanding preacher of the Gospel to the Gentiles - something no Old Testament prophet would be; and ultimately, a stunning Martyr:

"He preached the gospel together with the holy apostles. He went to many countries, teaching and converting many of the Jews and the Greeks to the knowledge of the Lord Christ. He sanctified them by the life-giving baptism.

This moved the Jews of Jerusalem to arrest him, and they tortured him by beating him severely, and putting a rope around his neck, and they dragged him outside the city. They stoned him there until he gave up his pure spirit. At this moment, a light came down from heaven. Everyone saw it as a continuous column between his body and heaven. A Jewish woman saw it and said, "Truly this man was righteous." She shouted in a loud voice, "I am a Christian and I believe in the God of this saint." They stoned her also and she died and was buried with him in one tomb."





Sean D. Pitman Larry: You make several mistaken claims here regarding 1) what happened during Hadrian's outlaw of the Sabbath, 2) the Apostolic Constitutions vs. the Didache, and 3) the Council of Laodicea trumping the Apostolic Constitutions.

First off, Hadrian did outlaw Sabbath observance in the early second century. However, this was primarily targeted at the Jews because of very bloody and costly Jewish revolts. Jerusalem was completely destroyed and then rebuilt as a Roman city with Roman temples. Jews were barred from even entering this city – while Christians were still allowed to enter. The Christians themselves largely got around the anti-Sabbath laws by "doing good deeds" and being generally active on the Sabbath – citing the activity of Jesus Himself on the Sabbath and how doing such activities for God was "lawful" to do on the Sabbath – as Jesus Himself point out. Research has shown that during the second and third centuries various prominent leaders of the Christian communities endeavored, by being busy doing "divine work" on the Sabbath, to cope with Roman laws against Sabbathkeeping – to include Irenaeus, Pothinus, Tertullian, Clement, and Origen.

Tertullian pointed out that, "it is lawful to do good on the Sabbath" (Mark 3:4) and went on to explain, "For when it says of the Sabbath-day, In it thou shalt not do any work of thine,' by the word thine it restricts the prohibition to human work—which everyone performs in his own employment or business—and not to divine work."

Likewise, Origin argued that Christian Sabbath observance should be different from Jewish Sabbath observance: "It is fitting for whoever is righteous among the saints to keep also the festival of the Sabbath. Which is, indeed, the festival of the Sabbath, except that concerning which the Apostle said, There remaineth therefore a sabbatismus, that is, a keeping of the Sabbath, to the people of God [Hebrews 4:9]'. Forsaking therefore the Judaic observance of the Sabbath, let us see what sort of observance of the Sabbath is expected of the Christian. On the day of the Sabbath nothing of worldly acts ought to be performed..."

Clement of Alexandria wrote in a similar manner regarding Sabbath observance for the Christian: "For the teacher of him who speaks and of him who hears is one—who waters both the mind and the word. Thus the Lord did not hinder from doing good while keeping the Sabbath; but allowed us to communicate of those divine mysteries, and of that holy light to those who are able to receive them."

Irenaeus also acknowledged that Christ did not do away with the law of the Sabbath. He emphasized, in contrast to the common Jewish position however, that Jesus said, "It is lawful to do good on the Sabbath" (Matt. 12:12, NKJV). It followed, then, that humanity need not be idle on the Sabbath: "And therefore the Lord reproved those who unjustly blamed Him for having healed upon the Sabbath-days. For He did not make void, but fulfilled the law. . . . And again, the law did not forbid those who were hungry on the Sabbath-days to take food lying ready at hand: it did, however, forbid them to reap and to gather into barns."

Of course, others took it a step further and started to allegorize the meaning and purpose of the Sabbath – according to the teachings of the Gnostics which heavily influenced those in Rome and Alexandria beginning within the 2nd Century. For example, Justin Martyr wrote: "If there is any perjured person or a thief among you, let him cease to be so; if any adulterer, let him repent; then he has kept the sweet and true sabbaths of God..."

It is therefore quite evident that the idea of being able to keep the Sabbath without actually being "idle," as were the Jews, was rather widespread among Christians. These men, as all other Christians, faced the constant possibility that because of some

adverse event the pagans would rise up against them, accusing the Christians of causing the gods to become angry. Thus, Christian leaders did what they could to demonstrate by their lives that they were upright, noble citizens.

All this taken into account sufficiently distinguished the Christians from the Jews regarding Sabbath observance in the eyes of the Romans who were, during Hadrian's time, primarily targeting the Jews themselves. Also, Hadrian's laws were not evenly enforced throughout the Roman Empire.

However, there is no doubt that the various attitudes of Christians relating to the Sabbath laws of Rome during the second and third centuries paved the way for the more drastic changes that took place in the fourth century, especially during the reign of Constantine.

Now, regarding your claim that the Apostolic Constitutions were entirely based on the Didache – this isn't exactly true (and it's irrelevant to the point). It is generally accepted that the Didache was written in the first century, while the Constitutions (made up of 8 books) were written in the fourth century. However, the first part of the Constitutions (Books 1-6) are a free re-wording of the Didascalia Apostolorum (not the same as the Didache). In contrast to the Didache, the Didascalia Apostolorum was written in the 3rd, not the 1st, century. While the Didascalia was clearly modeled on the earlier Didache, they aren't the same works. Of course, Book 7 of the Constitutions was partially based on the Didache in chapters 33-35. So, there are clear and distinct differences between these three works. And, the 4th century writer of the Constitutions clearly added elements that he considered to be relevant that may not have been in the previous works – elements unique from both the Didache and the Didascalia (especially with regard to the Gnostic spiritualizing of Sabbath observance).

While none of these writings is canonical, the Constitutions clearly shows that Sabbath observance was regarded as binding for the Christian, by its writer, as late as the 4th century in the region of Syria (or possibly Antioch). And, this conclusion is generally recognized by most historians.

As far as your claim that the Council of Laodicea trumping the Apostolic Constitutions (since the Council took place before the Constitutions in 363–364 AD vs. 375 to 380 AD) were written, that is completely irrelevant. In fact, it is quite telling that the Laodicean Council had to actually issue a decree, a cannon, making Sabbath observance illegal and punishable by excommunication – along with a command to try to force Christians to actually meet on Sunday instead. Clearly, this actions suggests that the Council saw Sabbath-keeping as a persistent problem for the church... right in line with the claims of the author of the Constitutions regarding Sabbath observance as still binding - - even after the Council's threats against those who continue to keep the Sabbath holy.

Again, it is quite clear, from numerous historical sources (the Constitutions only being one such source among many) that the early Christians continued to keep the Sabbath as a very common practice in most areas all over Asia, Africa, and Europe for hundreds of years – and in some places, like Ethiopia, until modern times. It is also telling that over 100 languages (ancient and modern) refer to the 7th day as the "Sabbath". Clearly, the concept of the Sabbath became very widespread around the world and in many many cultures (and not because of the Jews). There is simply no rational way to deny such facts of history by citing a few cases (primarily in Rome and Alexandria) where Christian leaders spoke out against Sabbath observance and gradually more and more in favor of Sunday observance.



Day celebration. Now I have some point by point analysis:



- a). The vast, overwhelming majority of Church Canons of the Ecumenical Councils (held between 325 AD and 787 AD) discussed the procedures regarding the Lord's Supper (sometimes referred to as "communion" and other times as "The Eucharist"). That is appropriate, since the Lord's Supper was and is the one and only sign of the New Covenant, and is repetitively emphasized throughout the New Testament. Adventists who approach Church history from a Sabbath-centric obsession; simply will never "get" what the Early Church was up to in its various Councils. It is incomprehensible to them. The Early Church focused on the Lord's Supper with a laser-like intensity. The 107 AD writings of Ignatius of Antioch are particularly instructive. Ignatius was a direct disciple of John, Peter and Paul and was the 2nd Bishop of Antioch, following Peter. In his writings, he referred to the Lord's Supper as the "Medicine of Immortality" and harshly denounced Sabbath Keeping as the Judaizing heresy.
- b). The notorious (for Adventists, anyway) Canon #29 of the 363 AD Council of Laodicea demanded the penalty of excommunication for Sabbath-Keeping Christians. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been excommunicated for violating the Canon. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point in Christian history.
- c). Similarly, Constantine's 325 AD edict set aside Sunday as a day of worship. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been excommunicated for violating Constantine's edict. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point. It is obvious that Constantine merely codified what universal Christian practice was at the time.
- d). Similarly, Emperor Hadrian's 135 AD edict banned Sabbath Keeping throughout the Roman Empire. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been persecuted for violating Hadrian's edict. But several Jewish Rabbis were famously-executed for violating the decree. That there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point was so painfully-obvious, it forced Adventist theologian Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi to concede that Christian "abandonment" of Sabbath-keeping was universal no later than 135 AD, in his Doctoral dissertation at the Pontifical Gregorian.
- e). In his oral defense of his Doctoral dissertation at the Pontifical Gregorian, Bacchiochi was then forced to concede that the AD 50 Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15) resolved the issue of Sabbath Keeping once and forever, when the Apostles rejected the application of any of the Mosaic Law to Gentile Christian Converts. The Apostles were given this authority over Christian practice in Matthew 18:18. Adventists simply disobey Jesus's command that gave the Apostles this authority.
- f). The Greek Orthodox Church has long officially-insisted that Sunday worship commenced on Resurrection morning. The Greeks are famously-hostile to Rome: If the Greeks believed that Rome instituted Sunday worship, they would adopt Saturday Keeping out of pure spite. The Greeks have long bitter memories about their excommunication of the Pope in 1054 AD, and the consequent revenge Sack of Constantinople in 1204 by the Latins. Pope John Paul 2 visited Athens in 2001, and the Greek Patriarch only agreed to a desultory visit after intense media pressure forced him to. The Greek government actively persecutes Roman Catholics, and has lost several appeals to the European Court of Human Rights. None of the disputes between the Eastern Church and Rome are mentioned ANYWHERE in the voluminous writings of Ellen White and Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi. That Constantinople was the capital of the Roman Empire for 1100 years is also never mentioned in their writings.
- g). Two Apostles Bartholomew and Thaddeus left Jerusalem and the confines of the Roman Empire and founded the Assyrian Church of the East and the Armenian Apostolic Church, just two years after the Resurrection. Both Apostles were brutally-martyred, and neither wrote an Epistle or a Gospel. They were never in communion with Rome and none of the laws of the

Roman Empire had any effect on them, since they were located in the Assyrian Empire and the Persian Empire. Neither of these non-Roman Empires spoke Greek or Latin, the languages of the Roman Empire and the Ecumenical Councils. In all respects, they were completely independent of the Churches of the Roman Empire. Neither of these churches sent delegates to the Ecumenical Councils. Archaeologists have unearthed Christian artifacts from the First Century in China and Korea from Assyrian Church missionaries. Both of these churches insist that they have worshiped on Sunday since they were founded, and have never kept the Sabbath. These two apostolic churches are mentioned NOWHERE in the voluminous writings of Ellen White and Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi.

- h). There was indeed a tiny-handful of Sabbath-Keeping observant Jewish Christian converts localized around Jerusalem, but this group of early Seventh Day Adventists was completely-extinct by 200 AD. They - like Adventists - rejected the Divinity of Christ; said Christ was a mere Angel; and insisted on vegetarianism and Saturday keeping as necessary for Salvation. These socalled "Ebionites" were frequently denounced by Early Church Fathers as heretics.
- i), Gentiles were banned from Sabbath Keeping by UNANIMOUS-rulings of the Jewish Courts, which imposed the Death Penalty on Gentiles who attempted to intrude on Israel's exclusive covenant from God. The Jewish Courts were given exclusive authority to interpret and enforce the law in Deuteronomy 17 and reaffirmed by Jesus in Matthew 23:1-3. Banning Gentile Sabbath-keeping is an obvious interpretation of the exclusive covenant between Israel and God found in Deuteronomy 5 and Exodus 31; and in light of God's frequent commands to the Israelites to eradicate and exterminate the Gentiles living among them. Ephesians 2 accurately refers to this division of Jews and Gentiles as a "Wall of Hostility." This state of affairs long predated the Birth of Christ.
- j). Hellenized Jews were the overwhelming majority of 1rst Century Jews that converted to Christianity, and they had jettisoned Sabbath-Keeping long before the Birth of Christ. The ferocious, murderous Greek hatred of the Sabbath and the jettisoning of the Sabbath by Hellenized Jews is well-documented in 1 Maccabees, Hellenized Jews and Greeks were at least 95 percent of the demographic makeup of the First Century Church. They did not resume Sabbath Keeping when they converted to Christianity. Sabbath Keeping was simply a non-issue in the Early Church, given this overwhelming anti-Sabbath-keeping demographic makeup of its members.

The overwhelming extrinsic evidence demonstrates that Christian Sabbath-abandonment occurred within the first year after the Resurrection at the LATEST, given that the two most important events in Christian history - the Resurrection and the Day of Pentecost (the "Birthday of the Church") - occurred on the First Day of the week.

This is not rocket science.

Adventists vehemently argue against the Jewish Lunar calendar that was clearly in effect at the time of Jesus, since observing the Sabbath on that calendar is overwhelmingly problematic. The Sabbath could fall on any day of the week of our present-day Gregorian calendar. It is just as likely to fall on Monday or Thursday as on Saturday. Adventists convened a committee in the 1930's to resolve this issue, since William Miller used the Lunar calendar to calculate the date of October 22, 1844. This is an acute embarrassment, since Adventists revere and CELEBRATE "The Great Disappointment!" Once the Adventist committee realized that the overwhelming evidence supports a Sabbath calculated using only a lunar calendar, is disbanded itself and left no notes of its deliberations. They knew that Sabbath-keeping is impossible in a modern-day work world with a lunar calendar. Saturday Keeping always was nothing more than a baseless and cynical marketing gimmick. Adopting a lunar calendar - which is mandated by the Bible's frequent references to the New Moons Holy Day - would destroy Adventism as a money-making machine.

SO now this ridiculous Rube Goldbeg cult celebrates the Great Disappointment calculated with a Lunar Calendar (since they know that this is the calendar used in Jesus's time), but a 7th-day Saturday day of worship calculated with Pope Gregory's calendar, adopted in the 1500's.

The two photos below show First Century Julian calendars, with their 8-weekly days denominated with letters from A-H.

"The Sabbath being abrogated, there is still room among us, first, to assemble on stated days for the hearing of the Word, the breaking of the mystical bread, and public prayer; and, secondly, to give our servants and labourers relaxation from labour."

This is not contented with one day, but requires the whole course of our lives, until being completely dead to ourselves, we are filled with the life of God. Christians, therefore, should have nothing to do with a superstitious observance of days.

...

I am obliged to dwell a little longer on this because some restless spirits are now making an outcry about the observance of the Lord's day. They complain that Christian people are trained in Judaism, because some observance of days is retained.

...

If superstition is dreaded, there was more danger in keeping the Jewish sabbath than the Lord's day as Christians now do. It being expedient to overthrow superstition, the Jewish holy day was abolished; and as a thing necessary to retain decency, orders and peace, in the Church, another day was appointed for that purpose.

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It was not, however, without a reason that the early Christians substituted what we call the Lord's day for the Sabbath. The resurrection of our Lord being the end and accomplishment of that true rest which the ancient sabbath typified, this day, by which types were abolished serves to warn Christians against adhering to a shadowy ceremony."

"XXXVI. O Lord Almighty You have created the world by Christ, and hast appointed the Sabbath in memory thereof, because that on that day You have made us rest from our works, for the meditation upon Your laws. You have also appointed festivals for the rejoicing of our souls, that we might come into the remembrance of that wisdom which was created by You; how He submitted to be made of a woman on our account; He appeared in life, and demonstrated Himself in His baptism; how He that appeared is both God and man; He suffered for us by Your permission, and died, and rose again by Your power: on which account we solemnly assemble to celebrate the feast of the resurrection on the Lord's day, and rejoice on account of Him who has conquered death, and has brought life and immortality to light. For by Him You have brought home the Gentiles to Yourself for a peculiar people, the true Israel beloved of God, and seeing God. For You O Lord, brought our fathers out of the land of Egypt, and delivered them out of the iron furnace, from clay and brick-making, and redeemed them out of the hands of Pharaoh, and of those under him, and led them through the sea as through dry land, and bore their manners in the wilderness, and bestowed on them all sorts of good things. You gave them the law or decalogue, which was pronounced by Your voice and written with Your hand. You enjoined the observation of the Sabbath, not affording them an occasion of idleness, but an opportunity of piety, for their knowledge of Your power, and the prohibition of evils; having limited them as within an holy circuit for the sake of doctrine, for the rejoicing upon the seventh period. On this account was there appointed one week, and seven weeks, and the seventh month, and the seventh year, and the revolution of these, the jubilee, which is the fiftieth year for remission, that men might have no occasion to pretend ignorance. On this account He permitted men every Sabbath to rest, that so no one might be willing to send one word out of his mouth in anger on the day of the Sabbath. For the Sabbath is the ceasing of the creation, the completion of the world, the inquiry after laws, and the grateful praise to God for the blessings He has bestowed upon men. All which the Lord's day excels, and shows the Mediator Himself, the Provider, the Lawgiver, the Cause of the resurrection, the First-born of the whole creation, God the Word, and man, who was born of Mary alone, without a man, who lived holily, who was crucified under Pontius Pilate, and died, and rose again from the dead. So that the Lord's day commands us to offer unto You, O Lord, thanksgiving for all. For this is the grace afforded by You, which on account of its greatness has obscured all other blessings."

This picture of God that your mother and her friends are promoting here paints God as an evil tyrant... something very different compared to the picture of God painted by the Bible. The Bible says that the soul that sins will actually die, not be tortured forever and ever in Hell. The soul of the wicked person will suffer "eternal punishment" in the form of eternal death – not eternal life in Hell (Ezekiel 18:4,20).

Beyond this, the Bible is quite clear that Jesus kept the Sabbath as God originally intended for it to be kept. He repeatedly pointed out that everything that He did on the Sabbath was "lawful" for everyone to do. It has always been true that it is lawful to do good on the Sabbath day. It is good to help both man and beast especially on the Sabbath day (Matthew 12:12). Jesus also made it clear that the Sabbath was created as a gift for all of mankind (anthropos), not just the Jews (Mark 2:27). His disciples continued to observe the Sabbath in like manner after Jesus was taken from them... and they taught those who came after them to do likewise. Despite what those like Larry Dean might tell you, the earliest Christians continued to observe the Sabbath wherever the Gospel was taught around the world. In fact, if you do your own research into this question, you will discover that Sabbath keeping was the norm throughout the Christian world for hundreds of years. At first, only the regions of Rome and Alexandria started to disregard the Sabbath, in favor of Sunday, beginning in the early second century (for reasons already discussed in some

detail in this particular thread). Everywhere else Christians continued to observe the Sabbath throughout Christendom - and to teach as to its importance and value to the Christian experience. This is all preserved in writing in many many documents. There really is no real disagreement here among most historians. Please look into it for yourself. He desires to earn the true love of the sentient beings that He has made. He desires true friendship and love – not just blind service from robot-like creatures. Well, such a situation, which God places upon Himself, means that He limits His own omnipotence so that He can actually create an environment where true love can exist. This means that He cannot simply wipe everyone's minds clean whenever things go awry. He cannot simply zap someone instantly out of existence without everyone fully understanding the reasons for removing someone from existence – otherwise He would create fear rather than love throughout the universe.

So, you see, you've created an omnipotent God that is actually evil – but you refuse to call eternal torture evil. While the author of the Apostolic Constitutions does in fact talk about observing the Lord's Day, fasting, and Easter, you are quite mistaken that the Constitutions advise Christians to only observe *one* Sabbath per year (please). That's just nonsense and anyone at all familiar with the Constitutions knows it. You seem to be deliberately misreading the relevant passages here in a rather desperate effort to support your original contention that Sabbath observance was extremely rare among early Christians (which is absolute nonsense given the abundant recorded evidence to the contrary). Of course, what the passage you quote actually says is that on only one Sabbath per year are Christians to *fast* – while the rest of the weekly Sabbaths are to be observed as festival days to the Lord.

Clearly, if you read *all* of the passages in the Constitutions dealing with Sabbath observance, it is quite clear that the Constitutions are promoting Sabbath observance on all of the weekly 7th-day Sabbaths. The Constitutions clearly advise the

Christian to reverence the Ten Commandments, including the weekly Sabbath of the Ten Commandments:

"Have before thine eyes the fear of God, and always remember the ten commandments of God, - to love the one and only Lord God with all thy strength; to give no heed to idols, or any other beings, as being lifeless gods, or irrational beings or demons. Consider the manifold workmanship of God, which received its beginning through Christ. Thou shalt observe the Sabbath, on account of Him who ceased from his work of creation, but ceased not from his work of providence: it is a rest for meditation of the law, not for idleness of the hands... O Lord Almighty, thou hast created the world by Christ, and hast appointed the Sabbath in memory thereof, because that on that day thou hast made us rest from our works, for the meditation upon thy laws. ... Thou didst give them the law or decalogue, which was pronounced by thy voice and written with thy hand. Thou didst enjoin the observation of the Sabbath, not affording them an occasion of idleness, but an opportunity of piety, for their knowledge of thy power, and the prohibition of evils; having limited them as within an holy circuit for the sake of doctrine, for the rejoicing upon the seventh period... On this account he permitted men every Sabbath to rest, that so no one might be willing to send one word out of his mouth in anger on the day of the Sabbath. In a 25-year career as a hard-bitten and jaded criminal defense attorney, I had some hard-won personal experiences dealing with the Problem of Evil ("POE"). I've earned my stripes, looking into that abyss. I've earned them, the hard way. For awhile, I was cocky and arrogant. None of the capital cases I had represented ended up with a client on Death Row. Not one in 25 years. That is still true. Only I am not cocky about it any more. This is what happened.

One day, I was a visiting with a potential new client on Death Row. He preached a rambling, rant of a "sermon." He preached it through the greasy, battered plexiglass, separating us, as we spoke on the phones. He preached from a tattered and greasy Gospel of John, that he had stolen from another Death Row inmate. He cut right to the core of my battered, jaded cynicism. I had seen and heard horrific things on a daily basis, for 25 years. It was starting to "get" to me. I was a raggedy-ass Death Penalty Defense attorney with a "thousand yard stare" from looking at far too many grizzly autopsy photos. He kept murmuring sympathetically: "Brotha, you got it BAD." I can still remember the warmth of his hand, through the plexiglass window, on my hand. I think I was hanging on for dear life.

I listened to his words, almost in a reverie. He was telling the truth. The daily train of grotesque human suffering had become more than I could bear. So I had a motto. I repeated it a lot. I repeated it because it kept me sane. I wasn't interested in plumbing the depths of the POE. I was more interested in a practical outcome. I wanted to get EVEN:

"If there is a God, the son of a bitch should be given a fair trial, then taken out and shot."

I meant it, too. My client knew the same thing. It was the philosophy that kept me mildly sane. It had kept him sane for years, too. This client on Death Row told me in blood-curdling measured tones how he survived in that human-made hell. He was a tough guy in a tough world. Here's what happened to him. A "shank" is a crude homemade stabbing tool that inmates make. He spent almost a year on his, by patiently-sawing through his plastic dinner tray with dental floss. And then he "shanked" another inmate with that sharp piece of plastic, splaying out the guts, hanging out of the abdomen. Then He was hopeless and at the end of his rope. Revenge was no relief from the human condition. Revenge is not the tonic for the POE. Seeing those guts made him realize that he was the cause of so much immense human suffering. He had no right to be cynical about it. Some people tolerate tragedy, poverty, and brutality as hard facts of life. Other people CAUSE those things.

He had an amazing light in his eyes, when he looked into my vacant, dead-killer eyes. His eyes verified his sermon. His world was transformed when he had inadvertently-discovered something after 10 years on "The Row." He had discovered and now worshiped a God, "man-enough to take a shank."

I had to look away.

In his eyes I saw something rare and powerful that I did not have, and I never had: Hope. A burning, powerful, hope. I walked away from his "home" behind the razor-wire at the Maximum Security Prison that day, feeling very strange. Something felt lighter. Something was different. I had encountered the God that keeps desperate condemned killers sane, in hellish places named anodyne names like "J-Block." "C-Seg." And Death Row. "The Row." Places where desperate people are "doing all day and all

night." I was a tragedy junkie. I loved and wallowed in the "sepia tones" of tragedy. This prison-macho God "man-enough to take a shank" made sense.

I had encountered the bad-assed, prison-macho God of J-Block and C-seg.

Several attorneys and law professors have written an analysis of the Gospels, using the ordinary Federal Rules of Civil Procedure. Two of them started out as diehard atheists. Professor Greenleaf - one of the founders of Harvard Law school - wrote my favorite one. These former- atheists realized that the Gospels and the Resurrection were events that would be admissible evidence in an ordinary court of law, and were more probably true than not. The Gospel's depiction of the Resurrection exceed the ordinary burden of proof that is the gold standard in any courtroom dispute. Believing in those events only required the same epistemology that every person uses to survive their ordinary day-to-day lives. I read those things and they made sense.

It was the "Reasonable Person" standard that all law is founded on.

God was admissible evidence, in a court of law.

I had set the burden of proof too high. I had been unreasonable. Some cracks started to emerge in my addiction to tragedy. <u>Like Reply Yesterday at 8:06am</u>

And then, I saw and heard horrific, shockingly-grizzly, unspeakable things with the last two capital murder cases. For six months, I would get up in the middle of the night, and sit on the shower floor with the water going, so that my poor wife could not hear my wracking, bone-cracking sobs. I had to wear sunglasses in restaurants, because when little kids saw my disfigured, soul-less, shark-like eyes, they would burst out crying. You could look in my black eyes and see all the way to my hellish soul. It forced me to look for the truth about my addiction to tragedy. Where did I go wrong? How did I end up like this?

Then a "left hook" came out of nowhere......

The Resurrection jumped up and bit me in the face. The God "man-enough to take a shank" revealed himself.

I was blinded by the Son.

It shocked me to the core and shocked me out of 25 years of hard-bitten, jaded, cynical agnosticism. It was time to leave that dear old friend behind. It had served me well. It had been necessary to survival, but only mere survival. I said goodbye to my old friend, and was baptized 6 months later. I began to heal very quickly from a lifetime of fear and terror. It is almost all gone. Those bitter dark nights of the soul are over.

"Res judicata" is a Latin term that means "the judgment is final, and not subject to appeal." How could any God worth serving be any less noble than this wonderful human-made concept? At some point, the struggle and litigation has to end. There has to be a final answer for all of the horrible suffering that I witnessed for 25 years.

The POE has to have an "end-game." God owes suffering humanity that much.

There has to be a final judgment, and one that we can trust. We have to have rest. And it has to be final. And so, I have adopted "Resjudicata" as my avatar.

My final judgment took place 2,000 years ago. I was found "Not Guilty," even though my guilt could not be any clearer. As the Greeks recall it, in first century Judea in AD 31 a half-man half-God creature killed itself and Resurrected itself in front of 500 eyewitnesses. My Death Row client had prophesied that this creature, was God, and "man-enough to take a shank." He was manenough to take it for ME. This God that is willing to suffer with us, is also worth worshiping. The Judgment that took place was once and forever:

"The Lamb was Worthy."

Nobody can dispute my verdict or question the fact that I was found "Not Guilty." I am 100 percent sure of that, more sure than anything that has ever happened in any other event in my life.

What started out as a mind-game toying with Rules of Evidence and dorm-room bullshit debates about the POE has morphed into something living and glowing inside of me. It feels like a tiny vibrant nuclear reactor has taken over my insides. I can feel it all the time. The light from that 2,000 year-old judgment keeps growing and growing and growing. The finality - and sheer animal

magnetism of it - is something that simply annihilates the POE. It is final and certain. I know that beyond all reasonable doubt.

I am Resjudicata. My judgment took place 2,000 years ago. It is the most final event in all of human history. The God "manenough to take a shank" took the punishment I deserved. He took it like a man.

I've always felt that I was deeply, even desperately, loved by God and that Jesus is constantly with me as my guide and comforter – through the power of the Holy Spirit. Again, I'm exactly the same as you are now in this regard – and I have been this way for a very long time. It is because of this knowledge and personal relationship with God that Christians should be the happiest and most joyful people in the world. We are truly blessed...

Where my difficulties lie with your moving on from the Adventist Church is that you and your parents have given up on certain biblical truths – to include the Sabbath of the Ten Commandments and idea that the soul is not inherently immortal and therefore the wicked will not be tortured for all eternity in Hell. Again, this isn't just "head knowledge" stuff. These ideas have real implications regarding the love and nature of Jesus and the rest of the Godhead. The God of the Bible is both just and loving while the concept of eternal torments of His enemies is neither just nor loving, but evil. There's just no other word for it. How do you get around that?

It remains as a taste of Heaven. Along with marriage and the gift of the Holy Spirit, the Sabbath is a reminder, and a guarantee even, of much much better things to come after the pain and suffering of this life. It's a constant battle between right and wrong. The sin reigns over them. The law doesn't keep them from doing it. No matter how hard they try. Even with the sin of adultery...I know that to be rampant in the Adventist church. Now, once a person is born again the desire to sin goes away completely. I can attest to this myself. I can also attest to this from some close friends also. I have a friend who was a raging alcoholic and drug addict. A Christian prayed for him and he surrendered his life to Christ and he was instantly delivered. He became born again and never had another drink or drug from that day forward. Although the temptation may still come at times he now has the power to say no. The sin no longer reigns over him. The struggle with his sin is no longer an issue. He walks with the Lord daily with freedom. This is what it Truly means to be born again. This is what the New Covenant is all about. The power of sin is broken because when Jesus died on the cross, he abolished the law that brings sin and death. Rom. 6:7 "For he who has died has been freed from sin." "For sin shall not have dominion over you, for you are not under the law but under grace." Rom 6:14

And having been set free from sin, you became slaves of righteousness." Rom 6:18

Just because we are now under grace doesn't me we are going to go out and sin. That desire is gone. This i think is what you have a hard time grasping. Sean D. Pitman Larry: First off, I never said that only in Rome and Alexandria did Christian leaders speak out against Sabbath observance. What I said was that through most of the Christian world the early Christians continued to observe the 7th-day Sabbath. Sabbath observance first started to slip away in Rome and Alexandria, beginning in the early 2nd century, while most of the rest of the Christian world continued to observe it. The evidence for this fact is overwhelming in literature.

Beyond this, I have a day job (usually work over 60 hours per week) and I simply cannot keep up with everything you write. I just don't have the time to respond, line-by-line, to each one of your points. So, I do what I can as I have the time.

As far as Bishop Chrysostom, he was not at all unique in his claims that the Sabbath "was not part of natural law". That is in fact the current Catholic position. However, this concept, thought it was becoming more and more popular in more and more Christian regions by the time of the 4th century, does not negate what the Constitutions themselves actually say regarding the Sabbath. It is quite clear that Sabbath observance was still in place for many Christian churches within and far beyond the 4th century. It really amazes me that you continue, desperately it seems, to try to argue against this historical reality. You claim that my ignorance is "shocking and brutal" even! Brutal? Really? How am I actually misreading what the documents I've presented actually say? Why do you try to warp the obvious meaning of the texts in question? And, how is pointing out that Sabbath observance remained common for many hundreds of years throughout most of Christendom "brutal" ignorance?

What seems most ignorant to me is your reading of the Constitutions and your claim that the Constitutions only commanded the observance of just one Sabbath per year. That's clearly a mistaken interpretation of the Constitutions. As I've already pointed out to you, the writer of the Constitutions (clearly not Chrysostom), pointed out that the 7th-day Sabbath was to be observed on a weekly basis with only one of those 52 Sabbaths being observed as a fast day (the day before Pascha at the time of the Passover) — while none of the others were to be observed as a fast day. According to the Constitutions, Sabbath observance in general was *not* to involve fasting — as explained here:

"We enjoin you to fast every fourth day of the week, and every day of the preparation, and the surplusage of your fast bestow upon the needy; every Sabbath day, excepting one, and every Lord's day, hold your solemn assemblies, and rejoice: for he will be guilty of sin who fasts on the Lord's day, being the day of the resurrection, or during the time of Pentecost, or, in general, who is sad on a festival day to the Lord. For on them we ought to rejoice, and not to mourn.-Apostolic Constitution Book V: Section XX

Also, notice this passage from the Cannon of the Holy Apostles (6th Ecumenical Council and contained within the 47th chapter of the 8th book of the Constitutions), which basically says the same thing:

"If any of the clergy be found fasting on the Lord's day [Sunday], or on the Sabbath, excepting the one (the Great and Holy

Saturday) only, let him be deposed. If a layman, let him be excommunicated."

So, there you have it. Fasting was originally forbidden every Sabbath during the year (and on every Sunday or "Lord's Day" as well), with the exception of the one Pascha Sabbath, because these were considered days of rejoicing, not fasting.

Again, I point out to you the use of the word "every" Sabbath day – not just once per year. That's what it actually says if you read it in context. The writer of these Constitutions is quite clear regarding Sabbath observance throughout the rest of the year – tying in Sabbath observance with the Decalogue, "written by thy hand" and that people should "rejoice upon the seventh period" because God "permitted men every Sabbath to rest... not affording them an occasion of idleness, but an opportunity of piety, for their knowledge of thy power, and the prohibition of evils; having limited them as within an holy circuit for the sake of doctrine." Notice here the term "every Sabbath" – not just once per year regardless of how the Eastern Orthodox Church currently does things.

Another way it could be said is as follows:

"But keep the Sabbath [rest each Saturday], and the Lord's day festival [go to church each Sunday]; because the former is the memorial of the creation, and the latter of the resurrection. [Now here an exception is made] But there is one only Sabbath to be observed by you in the whole year, which is that of our Lord's burial [the sabbath before Easter], on which men ought to keep a fast, but not a festival [because all the other Saturdays of the year are festivals and not fast days]."

This is what the writer of the Constitutions was obviously saying. To emphasize this point, the writer of the Constitutions points out that generally speaking the Sabbath day is not to be observed as a fast day – with the exception of the one Sabbath that occurs before Pascha.

Again, Sabbath observance has been lost over time, but this was not originally the case for the early Christian Church. I can only conclude that it is your own desire for self-deception that makes you blind to the otherwise overwhelming evidence along these lines – and unable to interpret the clear meaning of otherwise straightforward passages within as well as outside of the Bible.

Moreover, they have flatly-rejected the 10 Commandments "Ministry of Death written on Stone" and the "Veil over the heart" and the "Unbearable Yoke" and the "Wall of Hostility" that your thoroughly dark and depressing cult recommends. Nowhere in an Eastern Orthodox Church will you find an Icon of the Ten Commandments. Nowhere in Greece and Turkey - the hotbeds of Apostolic missionary activity in the First Century - will you find a public display of the Ten Commandments. 

<u>Sean D. Pitman Larry (Malia</u> and <u>Sandi</u>): Part1: Regarding the claim that the Greeks never have and never will accept the concept of Sabbath observance, that's simply not true. There is abundant historical evidence that the Eastern Orthodox Church originally observed the weekly Sabbath for many hundreds of years.

As I've mentioned before, the 5th-century historian Socrates Scholasticus of Constantinople noted that, "For although almost all churches throughout the world celebrate the sacred mysteries on the Sabbath of every week, yet the Christians of Alexandria and at Rome, on account of some ancient tradition, have ceased to do this." Sozomen (Salminius Hermias Sozomenus; 400-450 AD) also writes: "The people of Constantinople, and almost everywhere, assemble together on the Sabbath, as well as on the first day of the week, which custom is never observed in Rome or at Alexandria..."

Zeger-Bernard van Espen also writes that "among the Greeks the Sabbath was kept exactly as the Lord's day except so far as the cessation of work was concerned [since the Apostolic Constitutions allowed for "good works" to be done on Sabbath]." - "The Canons of the Synod of Laodicea," NPNF2 14:133, notes by van Espen

This difference between the Western and Eastern Church was over the original determination of the Eastern Church to follow the Apolostolic Constitutions – which conflicted with the determination of the Western Church, during later centuries, to distance itself from anything remotely resembling Judaic practices.

In the Eastern churches it was a general rule that there should be no fasting on Saturday and, specifically, that Saturday, as well as Sunday, should be exempt from fasting in the period before Easter. The Council in Trullo (692 AD) strongly reacted against the proposed changes of Rome (to include making the weekly Sabbath a day of fasting). In Canon 55 issued by the Council of Trullo, a portion of the Apostolic Constitutions was referenced which said, "If any cleric shall be found to fast on a Sunday or Saturday (except on one occasion only [during the Easter Weekend]) he is to be deposed; and if he is a layman he shall be cut off."

In this canon, the fathers of the Council in Trullo reacted against the noncanonical practice of fasting by the church in Rome on Saturdays and Sundays during Lent and throughout the year. At the end of the Apostolic Constitutions, "Ecclesiastical Canon"

no. 64 states: "If any one of the clergy be found to fast on the Lord's day, or on the Sabbath-day, excepting one only [Easter weekend], let him be deprived; but if he be one of the laity, let him be suspended." On the basis of this statement, the Eastern church adopted, as a general rule, that there should be no fasting on Sabbath, and that Sabbath and Sunday should be excluded from the period of fasting before Lent. The one exception in the whole liturgical year was the Sabbath just before Easter.

In fact, as I've explained in some detail before, there was only one Sabbath during the year when, according to the Council in Trullo (late 7th century), the faithful should fast: the "Great Sabbath of Lent". The Apostolic Constitutions 7.23 describe this as the Sabbath of "our Lord's burial, on which men ought to keep a fast, but not a festival. For inasmuch as the Creator was then under the earth, the sorrow for him is more forcible than the joy for the creation." It is clear that for the Eastern churches the Sabbath day, as well as Sunday, had to be set apart not just as a special day of nonfasting, but also as a day of worship on which the faithful should experience both the joy of the creation and the resurrection of Jesus.

Around the same time another learned theologian from the East, Nicetas Stethatos, wrote a booklet Libellus Contra Latinos, in which he accused the Roman church of breaking the rules of the Constitutions of the Holy Apostles against fasting on the Sabbath, as well as of being disobedient to the Scriptures and the canons of other church councils, which had forbidden this practice. - Nicetas Stethatos, "Libellus Contra Latinos," (PG 120:1011-1022).

Moreover, Pope Leo IX decided, early in the year of 1054, to send a group of theologians to Constantinople to discuss further the contended issues. This group consisted of three papal legates: Cardinal Humbert; Frederic, deacon and chancellor of the Church of Rome; and Peter, archbishop of Amalfi. Upon their arrival the papal legates discussed the disputed issues with the patriarch, the emperor, and publicly, with Nicetas Stethatos, in the presence of the emperor, his court, and other persons of high rank in affairs of state and church. Patriarch Michael Cerularius was offended by the letter brought to him by the legates and responded to the accusations concerning the Sabbath observance by saying: "For we are commanded also to honour the Sabbath equally with [Sunday] the Lord's [day], and to keep [it] and not to work on it." - Cerularius, "Letter I," (PG 120:777, 778) - - Humbert, "Brevis et Succincta Commemoratio," (PL 143:1001, 1002).

Pitman Part 2: After these unsuccessful discussions and other attempts to bring the Eastern church into submission to the Church of Rome, there occurred one of the most dramatic and most devastating events in the history of Christianity. On July 16, 1054, the Sabbath day, when preparations had been made for the liturgy on that day, the three papal legates entered the Church of St. Sophia and laid the bull of excommunication on the altar and walked away, toward Rome, shaking the dust from their feet. From that day on, the fracture between Constantinople and Rome has never been completely healed. The key problem being that the Eastern churches continued to observe the weekly Sabbath in a way that was much too similar to the way the Jews observed the weekly Sabbath...

In his work, Adversus Calumnis Graecorum (Against the Calumnies of the Greeks), Cardinal Humbert wrote (11th century): "Therefore, in such observance of the Sabbath, where and in what way do we [Latins] have anything in common with the Jews? For they are idle and keep a holiday on the Sabbath, neither ploughing nor reaping, and by reason of custom do not work, but they hold a festivity and a dinner, and their menservants, maidservants, cattle, and beasts of burden rest. But we [Latins] observe none of these things, but we do every [sort of] work, as on the preceding five days, and we fast as we fast on the sixth day [Friday] next to it. However, you [Greeks], if you do not judaize, tell (us) why do you have something in common with the Jews with the similar observance of the Sabbath? They certainly observe the Sabbath, and you observe (it); they dine, and always break the fast, on the Sabbath. In their forty day period they break the fast every Sabbath except one, and you [Greeks] in your forty day period break the fast every Sabbath except one. They [the Jewish Christians] have a twofold reason for observing the Sabbath, obviously by reason of the precept of Moses, and because the disciples were saddened and heavy (of heart) on this (Sabbath) day on account of the death of the Lord, whom they did not believe to be about to be resurrected. Wherefore, because you observe Sabbath with the Jews and with us Sunday, [the] Lord's day, you appear by such observance to imitate the sect of the Nazarenes, who in this manner accept the Christianity that they might not give up Judaism."

Here we see that Cardinal Humbert argued, as late as the 11th century, that the Christians from the East continued to celebrate the Sabbath in a similar way as do the Jews and Nazarene Christians ("why you have something in common with the Jews in a similar observance of the Sabbath?"; "They certainly observe the Sabbath, and you observe [it]"). He also states that the Jews and by analogy the Christians from the East "are idle and keep a holiday on the Sabbath, neither ploughing nor reaping, and by the reason of custom do not work." Further, he explains the theological reasons why the Jews and the Christians from the East observe the Sabbath: observing "the precept of Moses," according to the revelation given to humanity through the prophet Moses in the Pentateuch and more specifically the Ten Commandments, and (2) the fasting of the Orthodox Church on only one Sabbath during the year—the day when Christ was in the tomb and "the disciples were saddened and heavy (of heart) . . . on account of the death of the Lord." Cardinal Humbert concludes that since the Christians from the East "observe the Sabbath with the Jews" and the Lord's Day (Sunday) with the Latin church, they must be designated as a sect, not fully in line with the teaches of the Western Churches – which, according to Humbert, defined full and complete Christianity at that time.

At least equally important, if not more so, is the response given by Patriarch Michael Cerularius, in which he states that Christians are "commanded also to honour the Sabbath equally with the [Sunday] the Lord's [day], and to keep [it] and not to work on it." Consequently, Cerularius does not deny the accusations made by Humbert, but argues that the Christians are "commanded," by biblical revelation and the apostolic tradition, to honour, worship, and not work on the Sabbath - even as on Sunday.

Although sometimes this theological quarrel is blurred with cultural and nonbiblical elements, one cannot but appreciate the resolve of the fathers of the Council of Trullo, Patriarch Photius, and Patriarch Cerularius to remain faithful to the tradition of the apostles and church fathers. Five canons of the Synod in Trullo emphasize, in one way or another (four directly), the necessity for the Christian church to remain faithful to the truth about not fasting on Sabbath as expressed in the Apostolic Constitutions.

Unfortunately, the Eastern Orthodox Church did not follow the words of Patriarch Michael Cerularius. In the centuries to follow, little by little, Eastern Orthodoxy distanced itself in its understanding of the Sabbath from the Apostolic Constitutions, from the fathers assembled at the Synod of Trullo, and from Patriarchs Photius and Cerularius, and came ever closer to the Church of Rome's understanding of the Sabbath. However, the current practice of the Eastern Orthodox Church does not negate its original stand on Sabbath observance. A stand which fundamentally contradicts your assertions that the Greeks never ever observed the weekly Sabbath. Clearly, that simply isn't true. The Greeks did observe the weekly Sabbath for over a thousand years after the time of Christ.



There is no contradiction here. Both concepts are true: 1) It is impossible to keep from sinning without the new birth and the Holy Spirit living inside of one's self so that one no longer has the desire to sin. 2) The Ten Commandments should still be kept since they are in fact a description of the Royal Law of Love.

But, you say, that this is "impossible to do" – to actually keep the Ten Commandments. Yet, you yourself just said that what is impossible without the Holy Spirit is, in fact, possible with the Holy Spirit. It is the Holy Spirit that gives us both the desire and power not to sin. And, what is the definition of "sin" according to Paul and the other writers of the New Testament? Sin is consistently defined by the Law.

"I would not have known what sin was had it not been for the law. For I would not have known what coveting really was if the law had not said, "You shall not covet." (Romans 7:7)

"Sin is the transgression of the Law" (1 John 3:4).

So, while the Law cannot save you or make you good, the Law can tell you that what you are doing is wrong and sinful. That's the power of the Law – to point out sin whenever it happens. It can, therefore, show you that you need help and that you do in fact need the power of God to escape from the sin in your life... as defined by the Law. And, the only way of escape from sin in one's life is through rebirth into a new life governed by the power of the Holy Spirit.

Now, when I say that one doesn't need to keep the Sabbath to be saved, I'm talking about someone who is honestly ignorant of or sincerely misunderstands God's command in this regard. The same is true of all of the first four commands of the Decalogue. This is because the first four commandments of the Decalogue were not written on the heart by God, but have to be learned over time as they are revealed to a person through the study of God's written Word.

For example, what about the first command to have "no other gods"? How is that going to work for someone who doesn't yet know the True God?

Or, what about the second command that says not to create or worship idols? How is that going to work for someone who honestly doesn't know any better?

Or, what about the third command that says not to take the name of God in vain? How is that going to work for someone who really doesn't understand who God is or what His name means?

The same is true for the Sabbath commandment. God isn't going to hold anyone responsible for Sabbath observance who doesn't honestly understand it and God's wishes regarding the 7th day. It is different, however, for those who do understand God's wishes, but who still choose to disregard the His wishes anyway...

But, you argue, "The Sabbath is at the Adventist core. They believe that if you don't observe the Sabbath you won't be saved. Therefore, Adventists are under the law, NOT under grace and the new covenant."

This isn't correct as stated. Adventists believe that if one deliberately disobeys any of God's commands that one is not acting lovingly toward God. After all, it was Jesus who said, "If you love me, keep my commandments." (John 14:15). Of course, this is impossible to do without the power of the Holy Spirit – as we've previously discussed. You and I agree so far. In fact, you agree that it would be sinful to lie or murder or commit adultery. It is just that the Holy Spirit enables you to actually hate doing such things against your neighbor. Right? The same is true regarding the first four of the Ten Commandments as well – the ones that are directed at our love for God Himself. It is the Holy Spirit that actually gives us the desire to want to keep these first four Commandments along with the rest of them.

Again, it isn't our keeping of any of the Ten Commandments that saves us. It is our relationship with God that saves us. However, if we start to desire to go against one or more of God's commands, however small, we can know that we have moved away from a relationship based completely on love and trust.

This means, of course, that one doesn't have to be a Seventh-day Adventist to be saved. You can be saved even without keeping the Sabbath commandment if you are honestly ignorant regarding God's wishes here. However, if one is aware and understands God's wishes here, one becomes guilty of violating the Law of Love toward God if one deliberately chooses to disregard such a Divine command.

You see then, it wasn't Adventism or the Sabbath command that kept you in bondage any more than it was the command against murder or adultery or worshiping idols that kept you in bondage. Rather, it is the Holy Spirit that gives the true desire and power to actually follow all of God's commandments.

Yet, you write, "Adventists expect one to be perfect. It is impossible to keep the law perfectly."

You mean it is impossible to keep the law perfectly, to stop sinning, without the Holy Spirit? – right? That's what you said before. Think about it. Are you really suggesting that it is impossible for the Holy Spirit to keep you from murdering or committing adultery? – to keep you from even wanting to do these things? If not, then it is not impossible for the Holy Spirit to keep you from breaking the Sabbath command – in the same manner. The fact is that it is possible for the Holy Spirit to make you perfectly loving toward God and everyone else around you. And, perfect love is the same as being morally perfect before God. After all, it was Jesus who told the woman that He forgave to "Go and sin no more." (John 8:11). Why would He tell her this if it was an impossibility? Or, why would He say, "Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." (Matthew 5:48)? – if this is an impossibility for the Christian? It shouldn't be seen as an impossibility, but as a promise or as a gift of God where God supplies the means whereby we can be truly free from sin.

You write that keeping the Sabbath "requires discipline" – which is true. However, not murdering also requires discipline as well. Where do you get this discipline? From yourself? No. That's impossible. Neither you nor I have the discipline required to stop sinning. The required discipline, therefore, comes from God – from the power of the Holy Spirit working within us.

This Divine Power, of course, does not remove our ability to choose to reject God's commandments. After all, Adam and Eve were created perfect in the Garden of Eden, with a perfect relationship with God free of sin. Yet, they both deliberately chose to go against one of His commands, and fell into sin. It did take some discipline to obey – the power for which was supplied, abundantly, by God Himself. Yet, they did not lean on the power of God to protect them from sin, and they, depending upon their own power, fell into sin – and this evil world in which we now live was the result of that fall. The same can happen to us if we choose not to continue to hold only the Word of God with the power of His Spirit.

Again, it isn't like we have no part to play or conscious decisions to make here. We are free moral agents and have been given the ability to choose the right as God has given us to see the right (through the power of the Holy Spirit which He has also given to us). Or, we can choose to act contrary to what God has said, and reject the power of the Spirit and His leading in our lives – and remain separated from God and from the source of all life.

<u>Sean D. Pitman</u> <u>Sandi</u>: Of course these things aren't *inherently* salvational issues that we are discussing here. Sabbath observance isn't going to save anyone – and neither is a correct understanding of the state of the dead – or never having committed adultery or murder. None of that saves a person! The only thing that saves a person is a personal relationship with Jesus and what Jesus did for us in His life and death on the cross. That much we agree on.

Your mistake, however, is in thinking that if something isn't inherently salvational that it is therefore completely unimportant for the Christian. That simply isn't true. Just because remaining faithful to my wife and not committing adultery, even in my mind, does not save me, doesn't mean that not committing adultery isn't important for the Christian. It is important. It is a sign of love to God and my fellow man. Paul himself repeatedly highlights the importance of the Law as a mirror to the soul — to show the Christian if he/she is or isn't actually living a life of love.

So, is getting "bogged down" with the doctrinal issue of asking God to help me actually keep the Law, of asking God to change my mind so that I don't even think bad thoughts, really a problem for you? Of course not. You're all in favor of the doctrinal idea that at least 9 of the 10 commands of the Decalogue are important for the Christian to observe. As I originally pointed out in this thread, everything boils down for you over just 1 of the Ten Commandments – just one. All of this effort and discussion of yours is entirely about trying to absolve yourself of observing the Sabbath Commandment.

So, of course you say that there is nothing that can possibly be said to you or shown to you that could possibly change your mind regarding just this one Commandment – regardless of if Jesus observed the day and taught His disciples to do the same;

regardless of if Jesus' disciples also continued to observe the Sabbath and in turn taught their own disciples to do the same; regardless of if the early Christian Churches continued to keep the Sabbath; regardless of if most churches kept the Sabbath for hundreds of years thereafter and most church leaders promoted Sabbath sacredness (outside of Rome and Alexandria). According to you it doesn't matter if any of this is true or not. You have your mind made up and it simply doesn't matter what Jesus or His disciples told anyone else to do?

How then can you claim to love someone when, at the same time, you claim that it doesn't really matter one lick to you what they actually said or taught? How is that love Sandi? It's an honest question... a question that is salvational.

<u>Daniel Dulcich</u> Hermeneutics through Exegesis is a wonderful way to dig deeply into the word of God. Learning and understanding the biblical languages (i.e., Koine Greek, Semitic Greek, Aramaic, and Hebrew) adds knowledge of the Bible that gives us a wonderful view of Christ and the early church, through the writings of the Apostles.

Please don't misunderstand; I am not saying that you can't understand the gospel or the scriptures without that knowledge, but the lack of that knowledge can lead to easily misunderstanding passages and a reliance on your Pastor(s) and Theologians. There is the need for someone to know the biblical languages, in fact, it's why your Pastor(s) spend countless hours (years) at Seminary and in their home library rooting out the meaning through the original languages. And certainly, training through a solidly biblical foundational Seminary is necessary, so that we don't add or subtract from a biblical passage. In fact, my efforts below were put together with the assistance (peer reviewed) of several Seminary trained Theologians and current Pastors.

Here is a prime example of when and where the knowledge of the original biblical languages can clarify a point of scripture.

Topic: Colossians 2:16,17

Did the Apostle Paul teach the unknowing Gentiles (e.g., Romans, Greeks, Turks, Egyptians, etc.) that they were required to observe the Jewish weekly holy day, the weekly Sabbath? Given the numerous letters that Paul wrote, we should see clear evidence of this in each letter, or at least most letters. Although the lack of it's mention may be insufficient for determining its place in the Christian life, it does raise the question, "why isn't it taught?" However, there are plenty of examples where we repeatedly find Paul arguing against any required days which adds the clarity needed to make the determination that he did not teach them. In the book of Romans, we see the clear intent of this in chapter 14. In the book of Galatians, we see this in chapters 2 & 4, and, of course, we see this clear fact in Colossians 2:16,17.

In Colossians 2:16,17, some Sabbatarians would like you to think that Paul is only referring to the non-seventh day Sabbaths here, and elsewhere, yet when we look into the text we see that that is not the case. The structure of naming the feasts (food & drink), the festivals, the new moons, and then the weekly Sabbaths is found all throughout the Old Testament; a great example of this is found in Ezekiel 45 & 46. Ezekiel 45 lays out the structure, and Ezekiel 46 explains what each component is referring to; the Sabbaths (plural form) is a reference to the weekly Sabbath.

So, where Paul is clear, let the Sabbatarians take note!

Colossians 2:16-17 Therefore no one is to act as your judge in regard to food or drink or in respect to a festival or a new moon or a Sabbath day—things which are a mere shadow of what is to come; but the substance belongs to Christ.

The Koine Greek word used in Colossians 2:16 is "Sabbatōn". The use of "Sabbatōn" in the NT is used 59 times for the weekly Sabbath.

Diet and the Sabbath are not Tests of Christian fellowship.

Σαββατων (sabbaton- genitive plural) in Col. 2:16-17

Sabbatarians attempt to discredit the fact that the third reference in this passage is a reference to the Weekly Sabbath of the Decalogue by saying that Paul used the plural form of the word, which would signify it was one of the other kind of ceremonial Sabbaths. This attempt to evade the plain meaning of the passage doesn't work because there are about 20 other places in Scripture where the plural form of the word Sabbath ($\sigma\alpha\beta\beta\alpha\tau\omega\nu$) is used where context demands the meaning be the weekly Sabbath.

The Greeks didn't have the same concern over plural versus singular forms of words that is found in the English language. Of the 50 plus times the Greek NT uses the word $\sigma\alpha\beta\beta\alpha\tau$ ov (sabbaton) in its various declension cases, whether in the singular or plural, with or without the definite article, it ALWAYS mean the weekly Sabbath. This fact is so obvious to NT Greek students, that I will use ONE passage to demonstrate this.

In Matt. 12:1-12, the forms of σαββατον are used as follows: v.1- σάββασιν (dative plural), v. 2- σαββάτω (dative singular), v.5- σάββασιν (dative plural) and σάββατον (accusative singular), v. 8- σαββάτου (genitive singular), v. 10, 11 & 12- σάββασιν

(dative plural).

For the sake of showing it in all its declension forms, we also see in these texts- Mark 2:27- $\sigma \alpha \beta \beta \alpha \tau \sigma$ (nominative singular), Acts 17:2- $\sigma \alpha \beta \beta \alpha \tau \sigma$ (accusative/nominative plural), and Luke 4:16- $\sigma \alpha \beta \beta \alpha \tau \sigma$ (genitive plural).

The sentence structure of this text (Col. 2:16), FESTIVAL, NEW MOON, and SABBATH is a phrase used in the Hebrew OT to imply the three aspects of Jewish festival structure and designates the order of ANNUAL, MONTHLY, and WEEKLY festivals. This same annual, monthly, and weekly sequence appears five times in the Septuagint (Greek translation of the Hebrew Old Testament), in both ascending and descending order — i.e., 2 Chron. 2:4; 31:3; Neh. 10:33; Ezek. 45:17; Hosea 2:11. All through the history of the Israelites we have Annual Sabbaths, Monthly Sabbaths, and Weekly Sabbaths. If the word Sabbath as used here means monthly Sabbaths, the sentence would read, "Annual Sabbaths, Monthly Sabbaths, and Monthly Sabbaths." Which clearly would not make any sense and also violates the chiastic structure that we observe in this passage.

Whenever the Old Testament links the New Moon celebration with the Sabbath, as in Colossians 2:16, it is referring to the Weekly Sabbath (2 Kings 4:23, 1 Chron. 23:31, 2 Chron. 2:4; Neh. 10:33; Isa., 1:13; 66:23; Ezek. 45:17; 46.1: Hosea 2:11: Amos 8:5).

In the Old Testament, annual Sabbaths are always called "a Sabbath of (solemn) rest" in the Septuagint. This Greek version of the Old Testament always, or nearly always, translates this as $\sigma\alpha\beta\beta\alpha\tau\alpha$ $\sigma\alpha\beta\beta\alpha\tau\omega$ (see Lev. 16:31, 23:32, etc.) and not simply Sabbaton— as here in Colossians 2:16-17. Conclusively, the weekly Sabbath is what is referred to here.

Paul clearly states that these four things —diet, annual feasts, monthly feasts, and the weekly Sabbath, are not to be made tests of Christian belief, practice, and fellowship because they are merely shadows of things that were and are to come and Christ is the present Reality.

Further evidence evince that σαββάτων (sabbatōn- neuter noun, genitive, plural) always mean the weekly Sabbath in the New Testament (see Matthew 28:1, Mark 16:2, Luke 4:16, Luke 24:1, John 20:1, John 20:19, Acts 13:14, Acts 16:13, Acts 20:7, etc).

As is clearly demonstrated, the weekly Sabbath, along with all the others, is only a mere shadow that has Christ as its conclusive and paragonic Reality. Therefore, as Christians, Christ is our Sabbath and test of fellowship, not the by-gone shadow, the weekly Sabbath. He gives the real rest that the Sabbaths typified (Matt. 11:28-30) and this rest can be obtained and entered into "Today", that is, whenever we hear the Gospel and believe (Heb. 4:1-11). With regards to observing the weekly Sabbath, or any other day for that matter, Paul instructs that it is optional and is based on personal conviction and individual devotion to God (Rom. 14:5-6).

May our test of fellowship be faith in Christ and not diet and the observing of days. Rom. 14: 17- For the kingdom of God is not a matter of eating and drinking (may I venture to add "and the observing of the Sabbath") but of righteousness and peace and joy in the Holy Spirit.

The term "sabbaths", as used by Paul in Colossians 2 is clearly in reference to the ceremonial sabbaths which were a "shadow of things to come" - not the Sabbath of the decalogue which was not a prophetic shadow of things to come, but an eternal memorial of God's creative power instituted in Eden before the Fall of mankind and before the Jews existed.

It is very obvious to the careful student of scripture that the 7th Day Sabbath was not intended to be a shadow of the life and death of Christ, because it was instituted before sin existed on this planet and before the promise of Jesus' coming and death was given. Your position that the 7th-day Sabbath was classified, by Paul, along with all of the other ceremonial shadow sabbaths simply isn't consistent with everything else Paul wrote about the eternal Moral Law or with everything else the Bible has to say about the Moral Law and the 7th Day Sabbath as part of that unchanging Law. You yourself accept that 9 of the Ten Commandments are still in effect. You just reject one of them is all - as being a shadow. How does that make sense to you? How can 9 of the 10 be eternal while one is a temporary shadow? - even though it too was written on permanent stone by the finger of God Himself as a sign of His own creative power?

The ceremonial law, the ordinances written by the hand of Moses in a book, was clearly distinct from the Ten Commandments, which were written by the finger of God on tables of stone. In Leviticus, Moses makes note of the fact that the yearly ceremonial sabbaths, instituted for the purpose of offerings and sacrifices, were separate and distinct from the weekly Sabbath (Leviticus 23:37-38). The weekly seventh day Sabbath commandment is also distinctive in that it does not have any intrinsic requirement for sacrifices or burnt offerings (Exo. 20:8-11, Deut 5:12-15), and it is not set by the new moon.

Paul is saying that the believing Christian need not keep the ceremonial laws, the shadow sabbaths, because they find fulfillment in faith in Jesus Christ, the true Passover lamb. The schoolmaster was the yearly ceremonial sabbaths associated with the Hebrew Temple, which taught the plan of salvation through a coming Messiah, the Passover lamb of God. Now that salvation through Jesus of Nazareth is clear to the Gentile church, there is no further need of the schoolmaster (the earthly Temple, its ceremonies and shadow sabbaths) because that lesson has been learned by those with faith. However, nowhere does the Bible indicate that one of the Ten Commandments has been abrogated, or that the disciples or Jesus abandoned the weekly Seventh-day Sabbath for Sunday keeping. Indeed the Bible makes clear, that in the future, in the New Earth, all the ransomed will keep the true Seventh-day Sabbath (Isa 66:23).

"The following applications of Sabbath observance principles are recommended:

a. Provide emergency medical care willingly and cheerfully whenever needed with high levels of excellence. However, neither Adventist institutions nor physicians and dentists should provide the same office or clinic services on the Sabbath as they do on weekdays. b. Discontinue all routine activities that could be postponed. Usually this means a complete closing of those facilities and departments not immediately related to patient care, and the maintenance of a minimum number of qualified people in other departments to handle emergencies. c. Postpone elective diagnostic and therapeutic services. Decisions as to what is necessary or of an emergency nature should be made by the attending physician. If this privilege is abused, it should be dealt with by the hospital administration. Nonadministrative institutional employees should not become involved in making these decisions nor should they be obliged to confront the attending physicians. Misunderstandings may be avoided by making it clear in medical staff bylaws that only surgical, diagnostic, or therapeutic procedures which are not postponable because of the condition of the patient, will be done. A clear understanding with all who are appointed to staff membership, at the time of appointment, will do much to avoid misunderstandings and abuses. Convenience and elective surgery should be discouraged or limited on Fridays. Procedures thus scheduled allow the patient to be in the hospital over the weekend and hence lose fewer days at work. However, this places the first post-operative day, usually with the most intensive nursing care, on the Sabbath. d. Close administrative and business offices to routine business. Although it may be necessary to admit or discharge patients on the Sabbath, it is recommended that the rendering of bills and the collection of money be avoided. Never should the keeping of the Sabbath be a source of irritation to those we seek to serve and to save, but rather a hallmark of "the children of light" (Eph 5:8; Acts of the Apostles, p 260). e. Make the Sabbath a special day for patients, providing a memory of Christian witnessing never to be forgotten. Meaningful Sabbath-keeping is much easier to achieve in an institution that employs a predominantly Adventist staff. Presenting the Sabbath in a proper light can be accomplished by the believing workers employed in patient care, and may well be a convicting influence in the lives of those not of our faith. f. The direct care of the sick is a seven-day-a-week activity. Illness

knows no calendar. Nevertheless, when scheduling all personnel, health-care institutions should take into consideration the sincere religious beliefs, observances, and practices of each employee and prospective employee. The institution should make reasonable accommodation for such religious beliefs unless it is demonstrated that such accommodation would place an undue hardship on its operation. It is recognized that the consciences of individuals vary in regard to the propriety of Sabbath employment. Neither the Church nor its institutions can act as the conscience for its employees. Rather, reasonable accommodation should be made for individual conscience. g. Resist pressures for relaxing Seventh-day Adventist standards. Some institutions have been pressured by the communities, the medical staffs, and/or employees (where a majority is comprised of non-Adventists), to abandon or weaken Sabbath keeping principles and practices so that the Sabbath would be treated as any other day. In some cases, pressure has been applied to maintain full services on the Sabbath and reduce them on Sunday instead. Such action should be vigorously resisted. Compliance would cause serious reexamination of the relationship of such an institution to the Church. h. Educate employees who are not Seventh-day Adventist concerning Sabbath keeping principles practiced by the institution. Every non-Adventist, at the time of employment at an Adventist health care institution, should be made aware of Seventh-day Adventist principles, especially institutional policies regarding the observance of the Sabbath. Though non-Adventists may not believe as we do, they should know from the very beginning how they are expected to fit into the institutional program to help it reach its objectives, i. Foster an attitude for continuing Christian witnessing by Adventist employees. The only contact that many non-Adventist workers ever may have with Seventh-day Adventists may be in the institution employing them. Every relationship should be friendly, kind, and expressive of the love that exemplified the life and work of the Great Physician. Compassion for the sick, unselfish regard for our fellowman, an eagerness to serve, and unstinted loyalty to God and the Church may well prove to be a savor of life unto life. 

In a single day almost all of the 3,000 Tutsis who had gathered at the Adventist mission were slain, some 2,000 inside the Seventh-day Adventist church building itself. The bloodstains were no longer visible on the walls and floor when I visited Mugonero one week ago. The church is in fact still being used as an active place of worship. Near the entrance to the Mugonero high school there is, however, a small building with stacks of machete-hacked skulls as a memorial to what happened here more than 15 years ago.

Several months after the attack, in a short interview published in the Review, J. J. Nortey, then president of the African-Indian Ocean Division, said that as many as 99 percent of all Adventist workers in the Mugonero region—among them pastors, hospital personnel, and mission employees—were killed. In total, an estimated 10,000 Seventh-day Adventists died in Rwanda in barely three months.

Even more alarming in the aftermath of the genocide, however, is the fact that Adventists were not only among the victims. On February 19, 2003, Pastor Ntakirutimana was sentenced by the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda to 10 years in prison for complicity in crimes against humanity. The Tribunal found that Pastor Ntakirutimana, together with his son Gerard—the head doctor at the Adventist Mugonero Hospital—aided and abetted Hutu killers, going so far as to order the removal of church roofing so that Tutsis would have nowhere to hide.

But the Ntakirutimanas were not the only Adventists who sided with the killers. In regions with large numbers of Seventh-day Adventists, the killings were just as bad as in the rest of the country. "[T]here were church-going people seen in the mobs, cheering...those who did the killings," Nortey reported. Today, jails in Rwanda hold large numbers of Adventists who have been implicated in the genocide. According to one high level church official I spoke with at the Union office in Kigali, not only Adventist lay members but numerous Adventist pastors have been convicted by Rwanda's village level gacaca courts for their role in genocidal crimes against humanity. During the genocide, he told me, some Adventists maintained their Adventism by scrupulously resting from killing on Sabbaths.

The weekly cycle was set up in Genesis, and the holy 7th-day was clearly part of that cycle. This is reaffirmed in the 4th commandment where God reiterates that the holiness of the 7th day is due to the fact that it commemorates creation week. "For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but he rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy." (Exodus 20:11).

2. The 7th Day in Genesis is set aside as "and the evening and the morning were the 7th day". NO, time is NOT given for the 7th day in Genesis

That's really irrelevant since the pattern of days was already established. There simply is no need to be redundant here – especially since God reiterates the basis for the holiness of the 7th day in the 4th commandment.

3. God finished His work on the 6th day,

NO God finished His work on the 7th day Gen. 2:2

God finished His work of creating the physical space for mankind in six days – and rested from this particular labor on the 7-day. "By the seventh day God had finished the work he had been doing; so on the seventh day he rested from all his work." (Genesis 2:2). So, you see, it was on the 7th day that God created a period of time for rest and fellowship between Himself and mankind – a holy day that was set apart that completed the weekly cycle.

4. God wants people to come to church on Sabbath .

NO, God wants people to stay home...Exodus 16:27-28

It was the custom of Jesus Himself to go to the synagogue on Sabbath to worship as a congregation (Luke 4:16).

5. God gave the Sabbath to remind them of creation,

NO, God gave them the Sabbath to remind them of their deliverance from Egypt...Deut. 5:15

Actually, it was both. The wording of the 4th commandment also clearly states that the Sabbath was set up as a memorial of creation. "For in six days the LORD made the heavens and the earth, the sea, and all that is in them, but he rested on the seventh day. Therefore the LORD blessed the Sabbath day and made it holy." – Exodus 20:11

6. God gave the Sabbath to everybody,

NO, God gave it only to the Israelites as a special sign Exodus 31:13

God gave the Sabbath to Adam and Eve before there were any Jews. Jesus also noted that He Himself created the Sabbath for mankind, not just the Jews (Mark 2:27). Isaiah also notes that one day all of mankind will observe the Sabbath (Isaiah 66:23).

7. God gave only one holy Sabbath.

NO, God gave a list of holy Sabbaths. Lev. 23

Of course there are different types of Sabbaths – most of which were ceremonial sabbaths foreshadowing the coming of the Messiah. However, there is only one Sabbath of the Decalogue and this Sabbath points backward toward prior event(s) – to include the creation week as well as the deliverance of the Israelites from Egyptian bondage.

8. God declared that the 7th Day Sabbath was to be kept from "even to even".

NO, only the Ninth Day Sabbath was given that time boundary Leviticus 23:32

God marked off the boundaries of a day in Genesis – and this is how the Jews observed the Sabbath hours – from evening to evening. There has never been a controversy here on how the Jews observed the Sabbath at God's command.

9. God has never commanded worship on the FIRST DAY.

YES, He did, twice Leviticus 23:24 and Leviticus 23:39

The ceremonial sabbaths fell on various days of the week. This isn't the case, however, for the Sabbath of the Decalogue – a Sabbath which always fell on the 7th-day of the week throughout history.

10. God works on Sabbath and Jesus works on Sabbath even through the 4th commandment prohibits work. YES, John 5:17.

Jesus never broke the Sabbath. The "work" that Jesus performed was not proscribed for anyone to perform on the Sabbath day. God always made exception to allow for work which relieved the suffering of fellow human beings or even animals on the

Sabbath day. This was clearly pointed out, repeatedly, by Jesus Himself who explained that anyone who worked for the service of someone who was suffering or for the work of God in the service of humanity was guiltless before God for performing such acts of love on the Sabbath Day (Matthew 12:1-8).

Sean D. Pitman Margie Littell: The 7th-day was made "Holy" by God in Genesis. Holy for whom? Obviously, it was made holy for mankind – all of mankind. It was originally "made for mankind". Jesus confirms this "assumption", as you call it, by explaining to the Jews that the Sabbath was originally created, by Him, for all of mankind ("Anthropos" in the Greek) - not just the Jews (Mark 2:27). Jesus could easily have said that the Sabbath was made for the Jewish nation, but He didn't do this. Jesus clearly explained that the Sabbath existed before the Jews and was intended to be a blessing for all of mankind. In fact, the Sabbath was also known to the Jews before the Ten Commandments were written on tables of stone and given to Moses on Mt. Sinai (Exodus 16:21-30) – clearly supporting the statement in the 4th commandment that the Sabbath is and always has been a memorial of creation.

The fact of the matter is that Jesus Himself was a big fan of the Ten Commandments – all of them. And, He strove to teach His followers the importance of the moral Law written by His own finger on tablets of stone when He talked face-to-face with Moses. Isaiah prophesied concerning Jesus that, "He will exalt the law and make it honorable" (Is 42:21). And, that is exactly what Jesus did. He perfectly kept all of the Ten Commandments, including the 4th Commandment. He did not violate any one of them in thought or action.

For example, Mark and Luke cite a story of a man asking Jesus what he needed to do to be saved: "Now as He was going out on the road, one came running, knelt before Him, and asked Him, 'Good Teacher, what shall I do that I may inherit eternal life?' So Jesus said to him...'You know the commandments'" (Mark 10:17,19) and then He listed off several of the Ten Commandments and the moral obligations for mankind (also in Luke 18:19-20). He went on to say, "Whoever therefore breaks one of the least of these commandments, and teaches men so, shall be called least in the kingdom of heaven; but whoever does and teaches them, he shall be called great in the kingdom of heaven." (Matthew 5:19).

And His disciples, even after His death, continued to recognize the moral Law as binding for the Christian. Consider the words of John: "For this is the love of God, that we keep His commandments. And His commandments are not burdensome (1 John 5:3). In fact, sin was continually defined, in the New Testament writings, as the "transgression of the Law." (1 John 3:4). On this point, Paul is also quite clear when he says, "I would not have known sin except through the law. For I would not have known covetousness unless the law had said, 'You shall not covet." (Rom 7:7).

But several in this forum have continually tried to argue that Jesus specifically broke the Sabbath command. Well, that's just not how Jesus saw it – and his accusers could not answer His defense because according to their own laws He was right. Jesus clearly pointed out that it is *lawful* to do good on the Sabbath – not a violation of the Sabbath commandment at all (Matthew 12:12). If someone's sheep fell in a hole then it would be *lawful* to get it out - as Jesus explained and as the scribes and Pharisees who were accusing Jesus already knew full well. That's why they could not defend their accusations of "Sabbath breaking" against Him – according to the actual Law put in place by God.

So, not only did Jesus keep the Sabbath perfectly, He claimed to be the Creator of the Sabbath, and therefore the "Lord of the Sabbath" (Mark 2:28). And, He claimed to have created the Sabbath for all of mankind, from the very beginning of the creation of humanity, to enjoy as a beneficial gift!

As an aside, if Jesus is "Lord of the Sabbath", that would make the Sabbath, "The Lord's Day" (Rev. 1:10).

And, this isn't just my understanding of the eternal nature of the Sabbath of the Decalogue. This was the understanding of the disciples of Jesus as well – even after His death. The Sabbath was observed by Jesus and His followers at the time of His death.

According to Luke, "Then they returned and prepared spices and fragrant oils. And they rested on the Sabbath according to the commandment." (Luke 23:56).

Some may argue that some of His followers did not know that the Sabbath commandment was done away that quickly -- but certainly Luke would have known this if it were true since he wrote this account decades after Jesus died. If Luke, a long-time companion of the Apostle Paul, thought that the Sabbath was no longer binding after the death of Jesus, he would no doubt have clarified this, but he didn't do this. The rest of the disciples are also recording as worshiping on the Sabbath day, to include Paul who made it his custom (Acts 17:2). In fact, this custom was taught to the entire early church so much so that Sabbath observance was continued among Jewish and Gentile converts for quite some time. It first died out in Rome and Alexandria, but not until the early second century. And, outside of these regions, Sabbath observance often continued for many hundreds of years.

Consider, for example, the words of the 5th-century historian Socrates:

"For although almost all churches throughout the world celebrate the sacred mysteries on the sabbath of every week, yet the Christians of Alexandria and at Rome, on account of some ancient tradition, have ceased to do this. (Socrates Scholasticus. Ecclesiastical History, Book V, Chapter XXII. Excerpted from Nicene and Post-Nicene Fathers, Second Series, Volume 2. Edited by Philip Schaff and Henry Wace. American Edition, 1890. Online Edition Copyright © 2005 by K. Knight).

Sabbath-keeping also had a long history in the British Isles. Sabbath-keeping was clearly occurring in the Celtic regions until at least 886. The Celtic Church which occupied Ireland, Scotland, and Britain, had the Syriac (Byzantine) scriptures instead of the Latin vulgate of Rome. The Celtic Church, with the Waldenses and the Eastern empire, kept the seventh-day Sabbath... The Roman 'movement' to supersede the Celtic Sabbath with Sunday 'culminated in the production of an (apocryphal) 'Letter of Jesus', or 'Letter of Lord's day', alleged to have been found on the altar of Peter in Rome; and is said in the annals to have been brought to Ireland by a pilgrim (c. 886). Upon this basis laws were promulgated, imposing heavy penalties for those that violated on Sunday certain regulations derived from Jewish prohibitions for Sabbath. . . . (Ibid., page 28.) (Celtic Sabbath-Keeping Study No. 264, from Cherith Chronicle, April-June 1998, pp. 46-47.).

It is therefore not in the imitation of the Jews, but in obedience to Christ, and His holy apostles, that we observe that day." (Quoted in Bradford C.E. Sabbath Roots, The African Connection. L. Brown and Sons, Barre (VT), 1999, p. 26).

The 17th-century historian William Cave reported that the early Christians in Asia Minor (which he called "the Eastern parts"), kept the Sabbath. Notice his report:

"The Sabbath or Saturday (for so the word sabbatum is constantly used in the writings of the fathers, when speaking of it as it relates to Christians) was held by them in great veneration, and especially in the Eastern parts honoured with all the public solemnities of religion...This is plain, not only from some passages in Ignatius and Clemens's Constitutions, but from writers of more unquestionable credit and authority. When Paul was there at least two years after he wrote the epistle to the Galatians, he proceeded to show that he was in accord with his brethren in Jerusalem, as is recorded in Acts 21:20-24. Even after that, when he was at Rome, he said, "I have committed nothing against the people, or customs of our fathers." Acts 28:17.







Outside of Alexandria and Rome, this practice continued for hundreds of years within the Christian Churches – and within even Alexandria and Rome until the early second century. Paul himself regularly observed the Sabbath – as was his custom among both Jews and Gentiles alike.

When Paul came with the decrees from the council at Jerusalem, notifying the Christian Gentiles of their deliverance from circumcision and the ritual of the Jews, wherever he went he set the example by observing the Sabbath. When he came to Thessalonica, he, "as his manner was, went in unto them, and three Sabbath days reasoned with them out of the Scriptures." Acts 17:2. This states that it was Paul's manner, or custom, to do that. Then, when he went to Corinth, "he reasoned in the synagogues every Sabbath, and persuaded the Jews and the Greeks." Acts 18:4.

Note also that Paul himself claimed that he followed Jewish religious laws. He said, "Neither against the law of the Jews, neither against the temple.... have I offended anything at all." Acts 25:8. Clearly then, it was the habit of Paul to observe the Jewish Sabbath – and he did not teach or act contrary to this practice.

Sozomen, in the mid-fifth century reported:

THE ECCLESIASTICAL HISTORY OF SOZOMEN. Comprising a History of the Church, from a.d. 323 to a.d. 425. Book VII, Chapter XIX. Translated from the Greek. Revised by Chester D. Hartranft, Hartford Theological Seminary UNDER THE EDITORIAL SUPERVISION OF PHILIP SCHAFF, D.D., LL.D., AND HENRY WACE, D.D., Professor of Church History in the Union Theological Seminary, New York. Principal of King's College, London. T&T CLARK, EDINBURGH, circa 1846).

This shows that Sabbath keeping continued in parts of Asia Minor through the time of Sardis and into what is sometimes considered to be the Pergamos era, but that Rome and Alexandria were only observing Sunday (even though they observed the Sabbath until at least the early second century).

Gentiles were barred from Sabbath Keeping and Torah reading by rulings of the Jewish Courts (Deuteronomy 17 and Matthew 23:1-3). They faced the death penalty if they disobeyed. The Jewish Courts simply applied the obvious meaning of Deuteronomy 5 and Exodus 31, which makes it clear that the Sabbath is a unique sign between God and the Israelites:

"10.11 A non-Jew who busied himself with Torah is liable with his life He must involve himself in their Seven Commandments only. Similarly, a non-Jew who "rested" as one would on Shabbos, even on a weekday, is liable with the death penalty. There is no reason to mention (that he is culpable) if he invented his own holiday.

10.12 The principle here is that we do not permit them to make a new religion and create new commandments for themselves based on their own reasoning. They may only become Righteous Converts and accept upon themselves all the Commandments, or they must observe their own (Seven) Laws only, and not add or detract from them. If a non-Jew busied himself with Torah or made Shabbos or made up something new, we give him lashes and punish him and tell him that he is liable with the death penalty for doing this."

The Didache (c. AD 50-100)records that Christians were meeting for corporate worship on the first day of the week, the Lord's day.

"And when coming together on the Lord's own day, break bread and give thanks after confessing your transgressions. In that manner, your sacrifice will be pure. And do not let anyone coming with a quarrel against a brother join you until they get reconciled, in order that your sacrifice is not impure. For this has been spoken of by the Lord, "in every place and time offer me a pure sacrifice, for I am a great King," says the Lord, "and My name is wonderful among the nations."" (Didache Chapter 14)

100 AD BARNABAS "We keep the eighth day [Sunday] with joyfulness, the day also on which Jesus rose again from the dead" (The Epistle of Barnabas, 100 AD 15:6-8).

100 AD BARNABAS: Moreover God says to the Jews, 'Your new moons and Sabbaths I cannot endure.' You see how he says, 'The present Sabbaths are not acceptable to me, but the Sabbath which I have made in which, when I have rested [heaven: Heb 4] from all things, I will make the beginning of the eighth day which is the beginning of another world.' Wherefore we Christians keep the eighth day for joy, on which also Jesus arose from the dead and when he appeared ascended into heaven. (15:8f, The

Epistle of Barnabas, 100 AD, Ante-Nicene Fathers, vol. 1, pg. 147)

150AD EPISTLE OF THE APOSTLES.- I [Christ] have come into being on the eighth day which is the day of the Lord.

150AD JUSTIN: "He then speaks of those Gentiles, namely us, who in every place offer sacrifices to Him, i.e., the bread of the Eucharist, and also the cup of the Eucharist, affirming both that we glorify His name, and that you profane [it]. The command of circumcision, again, bidding [them] always circumcise the children on the eighth day, was a type of the true circumcision, by which we are circumcised from deceit and iniquity through Him who rose from the dead on the first day after the Sabbath, [namely through] our Lord Jesus Christ. For the first day after the Sabbath, remaining the first of all the days, is called, however, the eighth, according to the number of all the days of the cycle, and [yet] remains the first." (Justin, Dialogue 41:4)

150AD JUSTIN: ...those who have persecuted and do persecute Christ, if they do not repent, shall not inherit anything on the holy mountain. But the Gentiles, who have believed on Him, and have repented of the sins which they have committed, they shall receive the inheritance along with the patriarchs and the prophets, and the just men who are descended from Jacob, even although they neither keep the Sabbath, nor are circumcised, nor observe the feasts. Assuredly they shall receive the holy inheritance of God. (Dialogue With Trypho the Jew, 150-165 AD, Ante-Nicene Fathers, vol. 1, page 207)

150AD JUSTIN: But if we do not admit this, we shall be liable to fall into foolish opinion, as if it were not the same God who existed in the times of Enoch and all the rest, who neither were circumcised after the flesh, nor observed Sabbaths, nor any other rites, seeing that Moses enjoined such observances... For if there was no need of circumcision before Abraham, or of the observance of Sabbaths, of feasts and sacrifices, before Moses; no more need is there of them now, after that, according to the will of God, Jesus Christ the Son of God has been born without sin, of a virgin sprung from the stock of Abraham. (Dialogue With Trypho the Jew, 150-165 AD, Ante-Nicene Fathers, vol. 1, page 206)

150AD JUSTIN: "And on the day called Sunday, all who live in cities or in the country gather together to one place, and the memoirs of the apostles or the writings of the prophets are read, as long as time permits; then, when the reader has ceased, the president verbally instructs, and exhorts to the imitation of these good things. Then we all rise together and pray, and, as we before said, when our prayer is ended, bread and wine and water are brought, and the president in like manner offers prayers and thanksgivings, according to his ability, and the people assent, saying Amen; and there is a distribution to each, and a participation of that over which thanks have been given, and to those who are absent a portion is sent by the deacons. And they who are well to do, and willing, give what each thinks fit; and what is collected is deposited with the president, who succours the orphans and widows and those who, through sickness or any other cause, are in want, and those who are in bonds and the strangers sojourning among us, and in a word takes care of all who are in need. But Sunday is the day on which we all hold our common assembly, because it is the first day on which God, having wrought a change in the darkness and matter, made the world; and Jesus Christ our Saviour on the same day rose from the dead. For He was crucified on the day before that of Saturn (Saturday); and on the day after that of Saturn, which is the day of the Sun, having appeared to His apostles and disciples, He taught them these things, which we have submitted to you also for your consideration." (First apology of Justin, Weekly Worship of the Christians, Ch 68)

150AD JUSTIN: We are always together with one another. And for all the things with which we are supplied we bless the Maker of all through his Son Jesus Christ and through his Holy Spirit. And on the day called Sunday there is a gathering together in the same place of all who live in a city or a rural district. (There follows an account of a Christian worship service, which is quoted in VII.2.) We all make our assembly in common on the day of the Sun, since it is the first day, on which God changed the darkness and matter and made the world, and Jesus Christ our Savior arose from the dead on the same day. For they crucified him on the day before Saturn's day, and on the day after (which is the day of the Sun the appeared to his apostles and taught his disciples these things. (Apology, 1, 67:1-3, 7; First Apology, 145 AD, Ante-Nicene Fathers, Vol. 1, pg. 186)

200AD BARDESANES: Wherever we are, we are all called after the one name of Christ Christians. On one day, the first of the week, we assemble ourselves together (On Fate)

I could keep going with many, many more quotes, even from Ignatius of Antioch, that show that Christians have kept the first day, and referenced it as "The Lord's Day" since before John even wrote Revelation.

Sean D. Pitman It is quite clear that the discarding of the Sabbath starting quite early, during the early part of the second century after the Resurrection, in places like Rome and Alexandria. However, this was not universal and it did not start with the apostles of Christ. The Sabbath was observed by Jesus and His followers at the time of His death. According to Luke, "Then they returned and prepared spices and fragrant oils. And they rested on the Sabbath according to the commandment." (Luke 23:56).

Some may argue that some of His followers did not know that the Sabbath commandment was done away that quickly -- but certainly Luke would have known this if it were true since he wrote this account decades after Jesus died. If Luke, a long-time companion of the Apostle Paul, thought that the Sabbath was no longer binding after the death of Jesus, he would no doubt have

clarified this, but he didn't do this. The rest of the disciples are also recording as worshiping on the Sabbath day, to include Paul who made it his custom (Acts 17:2). In fact, this custom was taught to the entire early church so much so that Sabbath observance was continued among Jewish and Gentile converts for quite some time. It first died out in Rome and Alexandria, but not until the early second century. And, outside of these regions, Sabbath observance often continued for many hundreds of years.

Consider, for example, the words of the 5th-century historian Socrates:

"For although almost all churches throughout the world celebrate the sacred mysteries on the sabbath of every week, yet the Christians of Alexandria and at Rome, on account of some ancient tradition, have ceased to do this. (Socrates Scholasticus. Ecclesiastical History, Book V, Chapter XXII. Excerpted from Nicene and Post-Nicene Fathers, Second Series, Volume 2. Edited by Philip Schaff and Henry Wace. American Edition, 1890. Online Edition Copyright © 2005 by K. Knight).

Sabbath-keeping also had a long history in the British Isles. Sabbath-keeping was clearly occurring in the Celtic regions until at least 886. The Celtic Church which occupied Ireland, Scotland, and Britain, had the Syriac (Byzantine) scriptures instead of the Latin vulgate of Rome. The Celtic Church, with the Waldenses and the Eastern empire, kept the seventh-day Sabbath... The Roman 'movement' to supersede the Celtic Sabbath with Sunday 'culminated in the production of an (apocryphal) 'Letter of Jesus', or 'Letter of Lord's day', alleged to have been found on the altar of Peter in Rome; and is said in the annals to have been brought to Ireland by a pilgrim (c. 886). Upon this basis laws were promulgated, imposing heavy penalties for those that violated on Sunday certain regulations derived from Jewish prohibitions for Sabbath. . . . (Ibid., page 28.) (Celtic Sabbath-Keeping Study No. 264, from Cherith Chronicle, April-June 1998, pp. 46-47. http://www.giveshare.org/.../264.celtic-sabbath-keeping.html 6/24/06).

Notice some of the statements by Ethiopian Emperor Galawdewos (A.D. 1540-1559):

"We do celebrate the Sabbath, because God, after He had finished the Creation of the World, rested thereon...and that especially, since Christ came not to dissolve the law but to fulfill it. It is therefore not in the imitation of the Jews, but in obedience to Christ, and His holy apostles, that we observe that day." (Quoted in Bradford C.E. Sabbath Roots, The African Connection. L. Brown and Sons, Barre (VT), 1999, p. 26).

The 17th century historian William Cave reported that the early Christians in Asia Minor (which he called "the Eastern parts"), kept the Sabbath. Notice his report:

"The Sabbath or Saturday (for so the word sabbatum is constantly used in the writings of the fathers, when speaking of it as it relates to Christians) was held by them in great veneration, and especially in the Eastern parts honoured with all the public solemnities of religion...This is plain, not only from some passages in Ignatius and Clemens's Constitutions, but from writers of more unquestionable credit and authority. Athanasius, bishop of Alexandria, tells us, that they assembled on Saturdays, not that they were infected with Judaism, but only to worship Jesus Christ, the Lord of the Sabbath." (Cave William, D.D. Primitive Christianity: or the Religion of the Ancient Christians in the First Ages of the Gospel. 1840 edition revised by H. Cary. Oxford, London, pp. 84,85).

Ebionites and Nazarenes, groups who claimed descent from the Jerusalem church, were keeping the Sabbath in the fourth century, and their observance of Jewish laws probably goes back to apostolic times.

Polycarp, the disciple of the John the beloved, kept the seventh day Sabbath and endorsed the Ten Commandments as binding.

Scholars in this field recognize that the apostle James and the church at Jerusalem never gave up Sabbath keeping so long as Jerusalem stood. When Paul was there at least two years after he wrote the epistle to the Galatians, he proceeded to show that he was in accord with his brethren in Jerusalem, as is recorded in Acts 21:20-24. Even after that, when he was at Rome, he said, "I have committed nothing against the people, or customs of our fathers." Acts 28:17.

<u>Sean D. Pitman</u> THE EPISTLE OF BARNABAS: Not actually written by Barnabas, but probably by someone from Alexandria. It was probably written between the years 100 - 131 A.D. It is not accepted as Scripture for several reasons to include numerous errors and inconsistencies with the rest of Scripture.

THE EPISTLE OF THE APOSTLES: Also non-canonical... not written by any of the actual apostles of Christ. Also, there are different versions of the text – especially this particular passage that you cite. All we have are some fourth- or fifth-century Coptic fragments, a few small fifth-century Latin fragments, and several eighteenth-century Ethiopic manuscripts. The Ethiopic manuscripts alone preserve this document in its entirety. So, where the text says "eight," quotes from various web sites usually say "eighth day." Whether they have also added "day" to the phrase "day of the Lord," we cannot tell, since we don't presently have access to the Coptic text. But much more importantly, these web sites only cite the Coptic version, not the Ethiopic version,

without informing their readers of that fact. The Ethiopic version says nothing about days at all! In other words, the different versions say different things. One should also note that this quotation says nothing about Christians meeting for worship on either Sabbath or Sunday. All that is of interest is the quotation's apparent identification of Sunday as the "day of the Lord." But whether the writer thought every Sunday was the day of the Lord, or whether he thought that only Easter Sunday was the day of the Lord, cannot be determined from the passage. Since Sunday began to be called the Lord's day sometime in the last half of the second century, it would be no surprise if a document written around 150 A.D. did so. But 150 A.D. is about 120 years after the cross. That means that we have to wait until at least 120 years after the cross before we find any documents calling Sunday the Lord's day. Yet in regards to Epistula Apostolorum, it cannot be known for sure when the words in question made their way into the text. Were they part of the original? Were they added by the Coptic translator? Were they added by a fourth- or fifth-century copyist? No one knows for sure. But, in light of some commentaries on Justin Martyr (150 A.D.), identification of every Sunday as being the "Lord's day" seems unlikely (https://www.pickle-publishing.com/papers/sunday-fraud.htm).

JUSTIN MARTYR: Most of the rest of your quotes are from Justin Martyr. There would have had to be two very different professing Christian groups in Ephesus, Justin Martyr specifically claimed his group did not observe the Sabbath, keep the Feasts, or eat unleavened bread (Dialogue with Trypho, Chapter 18). Yet, according to the Catholic historian Eusebius, Polycrates later confirmed that Passover was continually kept on the 14th and unleavened bread was still eaten annually by the Christians who were the followers of Polycarp and John in Ephesus (Eusebius, Church History, Book V, Chapter 24). Perhaps it should be noted that in the famous letter The Martyrdom of Polycarp it is clear that those in Polycarp's area, which included Ephesus, still kept the Sabbath (Verse 8.1. Holmes MW, ed. As translated in The Apostolic Fathers Greek Texts and English Translations. Baker Books, Grand Rapids, 3rd printing 2004, p. 231) (more can information can be found in the article Location of the Early Church: Another Look at Ephesus, Smyrna, & Rome). It is possible that the reason that Justin Martyr decided to leave Ephesus and go to Rome was because the true Christians in Ephesus (and nearby Smyrna) would not accept him or his teachings. Also, the "eighth day" concept presented by Justin was a Gnostic concept called the Ogdoad that pagan philosophers advocated. As a philosopher this may be part of where Justin got his "eighth day" mystical ideas, but it isn't in the Bible outside of a period of time to wait before circumcision. The eighth day of circumcision had nothing to do with any day of the week--its was the eighth day of a male baby's life. There is NOTHING in the entire Bible that ties the circumcising on the eighth day of life to the seventh day Sabbath-rest. There are a couple of places in the Old Testament about the eighth day being a Sabbath (Leviticus 23:39; Nehemiah 8:18), but this is the eighth day associated with the first day of the Feast of Tabernacles (a Feast/Holy Day that Justin does not support) and it also has NOTHING to do with a day of the week. In addition, the earliest author you cite in favor of observing Sunday as a worship day (as opposed to the Sabbath) is Ignatius in his "Epistle to the Magnesians" around 107 AD. The problem here is that of the fifteen Epistles generally attributed to Ignatius, eight of them are outright forgeries. But, that's not all, of the remaining seven Epistles that Ignatius may have had a hand in writing, according to Eusebius, there are different versions – shorter and longer versions. And, now, it is generally accepted that the longer versions have been extensively corrupted and are clearly not reliable. And, many Christian historians also question the credibility of the shorter versions as well – to include Lardner (Credibility of the Gospel History, 1743), Jortin (1751), Mosheim (1755), Griesbach (1768), Rosenmüller (1795), Neander (1826), and many others.

Now, the passage many quote in the Epistle to the Magnesians is taken from the "longer form" of the text as follows:

"And after the observance of the Sabbath, let every friend of Christ keep the Lord's day as a festival, the Resurrection Day, the queen and chief of all the days." - Epistle to the Magnesians (longer form), chap 9

This particular passage that is most often cited was not actually written by Ignatius, but was written about the time that the Apostolical Constitutions from 375 to 380 AD. What is interesting here, however, is that even though this passage was written over 200 years after Ignatius, it still cites the fact that the Sabbath was being observed. This forged passage serves to highlight the transition from Sabbath to Sunday observance within the Christian church over time. Sunday, or the "Lord's Day" as it was later called, was more and more often observed as a fun day, a "festival" day, while the Sabbath was more and more often observed as a day of fasting – not fun at all. No wonder, then, that Sunday became the more popular day over the centuries.

As an aside, you have cited Barnabas and Justin in support of your position. However, there is something very interesting about these authors. If Sunday was known as the "Lord's day" during the last of the first and the early part of the second century, how can we explain the fact that the two strongest advocates of Sunday observance in the second century, Barnabas and Justin Martyr (in fact, the only ones thus far discovered, who denounced Sabbath observance and urged the observance of Sunday in that period - most of the rest of the church leaders and members during this time clearly continued to observe the Sabbath day as a day of worship) never referred to Sunday as "the Lord's day"? Although they were trying to find a reason for observing Sunday, yet they always referred to it simply as the first day, or the eighth day; and in one instance Justin used the heathen expression, "he tou heliou hemera," the day of the sun, in referring to it. If Sunday was then known as "the Lord's day," and these men were urging the observance of it, why did they not use that title, and cite the apostle John as their example? All this seems to indicate that these men and their associates knew nothing about Sunday as "the Lord's day."



"Weeks"), the Feast of Weeks, a prominent feast in the calendar of ancient Israel celebrating the giving of the Law to Moses at Sinai. Subsequently, "Pentecost" may refer to the Pentecost of the New Testament and Shavuot of the Old Testament. Shavuot is a significant event shared by Jews and Christians but Christians do not commonly celebrate it as a separate holiday.



Not that it matters, but Adventists also defiantly-disobey the Sabbath mandatory Death Penalty for violations and the mandatory offerings and Sacrifices (Numbers 15 and 28).
- d). While Adventists vehemently disobey the New Testament's admonition that the law including the Ten Commandments was nailed to the cross, they suggest that only the ceremonial law was nailed to the cross. Adventists defiantly disobey this, and comically adopt the "Ministry of Death Written on Stone." 2 Corinthians 3.
- e). But since Adventists disobeyed God's exclusive grant of authority to the Jewish Courts, and invented all kinds of extrabiblical rules for Saturday Keeping. They found out that without the "ceremonial" laws, that Saturday was impossible to keep. So they disobediently-made up their own extra-biblical authority.

f). Adventists also defiantly-disobeyed the decision of the Apostles in Acts 15 to reject circumcision, which jettisoned the entire Mosaic Law on behalf of Gentile Christians.

Now we get to the juicy "money shot:"

- Adventists claim that the Biblical rules that guide Sabbath keeping were "nailed to the Cross."
- But the rules for Saturday-keeping invented by Ellen White and the General Conference were NOT nailed to the cross.

Ellen White declared that the GC was "God's Highest Authority on Earth."

The foregoing demonstrates a consistent theme: Disobedience of the Bible and Godly authority given to both the Jewish Courts and the Apostles, by Adventists. And then elevating extra-biblical authority over biblical authority. With NO authority to do so.

The following applications of Sabbath observance principles are recommended:

a. Provide emergency medical care willingly and cheerfully whenever needed with high levels of excellence. However, neither Adventist institutions nor physicians and dentists should provide the same office or clinic services on the Sabbath as they do on weekdays. b. Discontinue all routine activities that could be postponed. Usually this means a complete closing of those facilities and departments not immediately related to patient care, and the maintenance of a minimum number of qualified people in other departments to handle emergencies. c. Postpone elective diagnostic and therapeutic services. Decisions as to what is necessary or of an emergency nature should be made by the attending physician. If this privilege is abused, it should be dealt with by the hospital administration. Nonadministrative institutional employees should not become involved in making these decisions nor

should they be obliged to confront the attending physicians. Misunderstandings may be avoided by making it clear in medical staff bylaws that only surgical, diagnostic, or therapeutic procedures which are not postponable because of the condition of the patient, will be done. A clear understanding with all who are appointed to staff membership, at the time of appointment, will do much to avoid misunderstandings and abuses. Convenience and elective surgery should be discouraged or limited on Fridays. Procedures thus scheduled allow the patient to be in the hospital over the weekend and hence lose fewer days at work. However, this places the first post-operative day, usually with the most intensive nursing care, on the Sabbath. d. Close administrative and business offices to routine business. Although it may be necessary to admit or discharge patients on the Sabbath, it is recommended that the rendering of bills and the collection of money be avoided. Never should the keeping of the Sabbath be a source of irritation to those we seek to serve and to save, but rather a hallmark of "the children of light" (Eph 5:8; Acts of the Apostles, p 260). e. Make the Sabbath a special day for patients, providing a memory of Christian witnessing never to be forgotten. Meaningful Sabbath-keeping is much easier to achieve in an institution that employs a predominantly Adventist staff. Presenting the Sabbath in a proper light can be accomplished by the believing workers employed in patient care, and may well be a convicting influence in the lives of those not of our faith. f. The direct care of the sick is a seven-day-a-week activity. Illness knows no calendar. Nevertheless, when scheduling all personnel, health-care institutions should take into consideration the sincere religious beliefs, observances, and practices of each employee and prospective employee. The institution should make reasonable accommodation for such religious beliefs unless it is demonstrated that such accommodation would place an undue hardship on its operation. It is recognized that the consciences of individuals vary in regard to the propriety of Sabbath employment. Neither the Church nor its institutions can act as the conscience for its employees. Rather, reasonable accommodation should be made for individual conscience. g. Resist pressures for relaxing Seventh-day Adventist standards. Some institutions have been pressured by the communities, the medical staffs, and/or employees (where a majority is comprised of non-Adventists), to abandon or weaken Sabbath keeping principles and practices so that the Sabbath would be treated as any other day. In some cases, pressure has been applied to maintain full services on the Sabbath and reduce them on Sunday instead. Such action should be vigorously resisted. Compliance would cause serious reexamination of the relationship of such an institution to the Church. h. Educate employees who are not Seventh-day Adventist concerning Sabbath keeping principles practiced by the institution. Every non-Adventist, at the time of employment at an Adventist health care institution, should be made aware of Seventh-day Adventist principles, especially institutional policies regarding the observance of the Sabbath. Though non-Adventists may not believe as we do, they should know from the very beginning how they are expected to fit into the institutional program to help it reach its objectives, i. Foster an attitude for continuing Christian witnessing by Adventist employees. The only contact that many non-Adventist workers ever may have with Seventh-day Adventists may be in the institution employing them. Every relationship should be friendly, kind, and expressive of the love that exemplified the life and work of the Great Physician. Compassion for the sick, unselfish regard for our fellowman, an eagerness to serve, and unstinted loyalty to God and the Church may well prove to be a savor of life unto life. The keeping of the Sabbath is a privilege and an honor as well as a duty. 

[4] She also argued that acceptance of her own writings should not be used as a test of fellowship within the church. James White, thrice General Conference president, speaking of the work of Ellen G. White, expressly declares that Adventists believe that God called her "to do a special work at this time, among this people. They do not, however, make a belief in this work a test of Christian fellowship." [5] And, Mrs. White herself explained, "Such should not be deprived of the benefits and privileges of the church, if their Christian course is otherwise correct, and they have formed a good Christian character." [6]





4,000 Adventists were slaughtered by other Adventists in the Rwanda genocide. they kept Saturday though, and refrained from murder on that day.

"The answer to this plea came the next day, Sabbath morning, at approximately 9 o'clock am. The attackers advanced toward the church from all sides chanting "Eliminate the Tutsis!" They worked methodically with guns and machetes, moving from church to school to hospital. The victims, weak from food and water deprivation, mounted a feeble defense with bricks and stones. But they were overcome with little effort. The killers, keen to spare bullets, only paused when the physical exertion of chopping and spearing demanded rest. By evening, mop-up operations had begun: tear gas was fired to cause any living Tutsis among the corpses to cry out. The attackers then made sure these joined the rest.

In the end, Mugonero may have been the worst single massacre in the entire 1994 genocide. In a single day almost all of the 3,000 Tutsis who had gathered at the Adventist mission were slain, some 2,000 inside the Seventh-day Adventist church building itself. The bloodstains were no longer visible on the walls and floor when I visited Mugonero one week ago. The church is in fact still being used as an active place of worship. Near the entrance to the Mugonero high school there is, however, a small building with stacks of machete-hacked skulls as a memorial to what happened here more than 15 years ago.

Several months after the attack, in a short interview published in the Review, J. J. Nortey, then president of the African-Indian Ocean Division, said that as many as 99 percent of all Adventist workers in the Mugonero region—among them pastors, hospital personnel, and mission employees—were killed. In total, an estimated 10,000 Seventh-day Adventists died in Rwanda in barely three months.

Even more alarming in the aftermath of the genocide, however, is the fact that Adventists were not only among the victims. On February 19, 2003, Pastor Ntakirutimana was sentenced by the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda to 10 years in prison for complicity in crimes against humanity. The Tribunal found that Pastor Ntakirutimana, together with his son Gerard—the head doctor at the Adventist Mugonero Hospital—aided and abetted Hutu killers, going so far as to order the removal of church roofing so that Tutsis would have nowhere to hide.

But the Ntakirutimanas were not the only Adventists who sided with the killers. In regions with large numbers of Seventh-day Adventists, the killings were just as bad as in the rest of the country. "[T]here were church-going people seen in the mobs, cheering...those who did the killings," Nortey reported. Today, jails in Rwanda hold large numbers of Adventists who have been implicated in the genocide. According to one high level church official I spoke with at the Union office in Kigali, not only

Adventist lay members but numerous Adventist pastors have been convicted by Rwanda's village level gacaca courts for their role in genocidal crimes against humanity. During the genocide, he told me, some Adventists maintained their Adventism by scrupulously resting from killing on Sabbaths.

Levý reported that while traveling in war-torn Burundi (which borders Rwanda and is comprised of the same Hutu and Tutsi tribes) he asked a taxi driver to take him to the southern part of the country. The driver consented, but on one condition: the trip had to be on Saturday. "Why on Saturday?" Levý writes. "Because the 'genocidal aggressors', those Hutu of the National Liberation Front, of which the whole country continues to repeat by memory abominable crimes... they are also good Christians, mostly of Adventist confession, who don't smoke, don't drink, arrive at the villages singing loud songs and consider Saturday a sacred day, dedicated to prayer, in which one must not kill."





"The answer to this plea came the next day, Sabbath morning, at approximately 9 o'clock am. The attackers advanced toward the church from all sides chanting "Eliminate the Tutsis!" They worked methodically with guns and machetes, moving from church to school to hospital. The victims, weak from food and water deprivation, mounted a feeble defense with bricks and stones. But they were overcome with little effort. The killers, keen to spare bullets, only paused when the physical exertion of chopping and spearing demanded rest. By evening, mop-up operations had begun: tear gas was fired to cause any living Tutsis among the corpses to cry out. The attackers then made sure these joined the rest.

In the end, Mugonero may have been the worst single massacre in the entire 1994 genocide. In a single day almost all of the 3,000 Tutsis who had gathered at the Adventist mission were slain, some 2,000 inside the Seventh-day Adventist church building itself. The bloodstains were no longer visible on the walls and floor when I visited Mugonero one week ago. The church is in fact still being used as an active place of worship. Near the entrance to the Mugonero high school there is, however, a small building with stacks of machete-hacked skulls as a memorial to what happened here more than 15 years ago.

Several months after the attack, in a short interview published in the Review, J. J. Nortey, then president of the African-Indian Ocean Division, said that as many as 99 percent of all Adventist workers in the Mugonero region—among them pastors, hospital personnel, and mission employees—were killed. In total, an estimated 10,000 Seventh-day Adventists died in Rwanda in barely three months.

Even more alarming in the aftermath of the genocide, however, is the fact that Adventists were not only among the victims. On

February 19, 2003, Pastor Ntakirutimana was sentenced by the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda to 10 years in prison for complicity in crimes against humanity. The Tribunal found that Pastor Ntakirutimana, together with his son Gerard—the head doctor at the Adventist Mugonero Hospital-aided and abetted Hutu killers, going so far as to order the removal of church roofing so that Tutsis would have nowhere to hide.

But the Ntakirutimanas were not the only Adventists who sided with the killers. In regions with large numbers of Seventh-day Adventists, the killings were just as bad as in the rest of the country. "[T]here were church-going people seen in the mobs, cheering...those who did the killings," Nortey reported. Today, jails in Rwanda hold large numbers of Adventists who have been implicated in the genocide. According to one high level church official I spoke with at the Union office in Kigali, not only Adventist lay members but numerous Adventist pastors have been convicted by Rwanda's village level gacaca courts for their role in genocidal crimes against humanity. During the genocide, he told me, some Adventists maintained their Adventism by scrupulously resting from killing on Sabbaths.

Levý reported that while traveling in war-torn Burundi (which borders Rwanda and is comprised of the same Hutu and Tutsi tribes) he asked a taxi driver to take him to the southern part of the country. The driver consented, but on one condition: the trip had to be on Saturday. "Why on Saturday?" Levý writes. "Because the 'genocidal aggressors', those Hutu of the National Liberation Front, of which the whole country continues to repeat by memory abominable crimes... they are also good Christians, mostly of Adventist confession, who don't smoke, don't drink, arrive at the villages singing loud songs and consider Saturday a sacred day, dedicated to prayer, in which one must not kill." http://spectrummagazine.org/node/2716

<u>Larry Dean</u> I just went through a bunch of Church Canons adopted the Ecumenical Councils. I earlier posted Canon #29 of the Council of Laodicea, which banned Sabbath-keeping for Christians and extolled the Lord's Day celebration. Here's some point by point observations:

- a). The vast, overwhelming majority of Church Canons discussed the procedures regarding the Lord's Supper (sometimes referred to as "communion" and other times as "The Eucharist"). That is appropriate, since the Lord's Supper was the one and only sign of the New Covenant, and is similarly repeatedly emphasized throughout the New Testament. Adventists who approach Church history from the standpoint of the Sabbath as their sign; simply will never "get" what the Early Church was up to in its various Councils.
- b). The notorious (for Adventists, anyway) Canon #29 of the 363 AD Council of Laodicea demanded the excommunication of Sabbath-Keeping Christians. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been excommunicated for violating the Canon. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point.
- c). Similarly, Constantine's 325 AD edict set aside Sunday as a day of worship. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been excommunicated for violating Constantine's edict. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point. It is obvious that Constantine merely adopted what Christian practice was at the time.
- d). Similarly, Emperor Hadrian's 135 AD edict banned Sabbath Keeping throughout the Empire. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been persecuted for violating Hadrian's edict. Several Jewish Rabbis were famously-executed for violating the decree. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point, which forced Adventist theologian Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi to concede that Christian "abandonment" of Sabbath-keeping was universal no later than 135 AD.
- e). In is oral defense of his Doctoral dissertation at the Pontifical Gregorian, Bacchiochi was forced to concede that the AD 50 Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15) resolved the issue of Sabbath Keeping once and forever, when the Apostles rejected the Application of any of the Mosaic Law to Gentile Christian Converts. The Apostles were given this authority over the law in Matthew 18:18.
- f). The Greek Orthodox Church has long officially insisted that Sunday worship commenced on Resurrection morning. You can look it up on the Patriarch of Constantinople's website. The Greeks are famously hostile to Rome: If the Greeks believed that Rome instituted Sunday worship, they would adopt Saturday Keeping out of pure spite. The Greeks have long memories about excommunicating the Pope in 1054 AD, and the consequent Sack of Constantinople in 1204. Pope John Paul 2 visited Athens in 2001, and the Greek Patriarch only agreed to a desultory visit after intense media pressure forced him to. The Greek government actively persecutes Roman Catholics, and has lost several appeals to the European Court of Human Rights. None of the disputes between the Eastern Church and Rome are mentioned ANYWHERE in the voluminous writings of Ellen White and Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi. That Constantinople was the capital of the Roman Empire for 1100 years is also never mentioned in their writings.

g). Two Apostles - Bartholomew and Thaddeus - left Jerusalem and the borders of the Roman Empire and founded the Assyrian Church of the East and the Armenian Apostolic Church, just two years after the Resurrection. Both Apostles were martyred, and neither wrote an Epistle or a Gospel. They were never in communion with Rome and none of the laws of the Roman Empire had any effect on them, since they were located in the Assyrian Empire and the Persian Empire. Neither of these non-Roman Empires spoke Greek or Latin, the languages of the Roman Empire. Neither of these churches sent delegates to the Ecumenical Councils. Archaeologists have unearthed Christian artifacts from the First Century in China and Korea from Assyrian Church missionaries.

Both of these churches insist that they have worshiped on Sunday since they were founded, and have never kept the Sabbath. They are mentioned NOWHERE in the voluminous writings of Ellen White and Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi.

- h). There was indeed a handful of Sabbath-Keeping observant Jewish Christian converts localized around Jerusalem, but this group of early Seventh Day Adventists was extinct by 200 AD. They like Adventists rejected the Divinity of Christ; said Christ was a mere Angel; and insisted on vegetarianism and Saturday keeping as necessary for Salvation. The Ebionites as they were called were frequently denounced by Christians as heretics.
- i). Gentiles were banned from Sabbath Keeping by rulings of the Jewish Courts, which imposed the Death Penalty on Gentiles who attempted to intrude on Israel's exclusive covenant from God. The Hellenized Jews were the overwhelming majority of 1rst Century Jews that converted to Christianity, and they had jettisoned Sabbath-Keeping long before the Birth of Christ. The ferocious Greek hatred of the Sabbath and the jettisoning of the Sabbath by Hellenized Jews is well-documented in 1 Maccabees. Hellenized Jews and Gentiles were at least 95 percent of the demographic makeup of the First Century Church. They did not resume Sabbath Keeping when they converted to Christianity.

The overwhelming extrinsic evidence demonstrates that Christian Sabbath-abandonment occurred within the first year after the Resurrection, given that the two most important events of Christianity - the Resurrection and the Day of Pentecost (the "Birthday of the Church") - occurred on the First Day of the week.

<u>Larry Dean</u> I just went through a bunch of Church Canons adopted the Ecumenical Councils. I earlier posted Canon #29 of the Council of Laodicea, which banned Sabbath-keeping for Christians and extolled the Lord's Day celebration. Here's some point by point observations:

- a). The vast, overwhelming majority of Church Canons discussed the procedures regarding the Lord's Supper (sometimes referred to as "communion" and other times as "The Eucharist"). That is appropriate, since the Lord's Supper was the one and only sign of the New Covenant, and is similarly repeatedly emphasized throughout the New Testament. Adventists who approach Church history from the standpoint of the Sabbath as their sign; simply will never "get" what the Early Church was up to in its various Councils.
- b). The notorious (for Adventists, anyway) Canon #29 of the 363 AD Council of Laodicea demanded the excommunication of Sabbath-Keeping Christians. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been excommunicated for violating the Canon. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point.
- c). Similarly, Constantine's 325 AD edict set aside Sunday as a day of worship. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been excommunicated for violating Constantine's edict. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point. It is obvious that Constantine merely adopted what Christian practice was at the time.
- d). Similarly, Emperor Hadrian's 135 AD edict banned Sabbath Keeping throughout the Empire. I could find NO evidence that any Sabbath-Keeping Christians had ever been persecuted for violating Hadrian's edict. Several Jewish Rabbis were famously-executed for violating the decree. It is obvious that there were no Sabbath-Keeping Christians by that point, which forced Adventist theologian Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi to concede that Christian "abandonment" of Sabbath-keeping was universal no later than 135 AD.

- e). In is oral defense of his Doctoral dissertation at the Pontifical Gregorian, Bacchiochi was forced to concede that the AD 50 Council of Jerusalem (Acts 15) resolved the issue of Sabbath Keeping once and forever, when the Apostles rejected the Application of any of the Mosaic Law to Gentile Christian Converts. The Apostles were given this authority over the law in Matthew 18:18.
- f). The Greek Orthodox Church has long officially insisted that Sunday worship commenced on Resurrection morning. You can look it up on the Patriarch of Constantinople's website. The Greeks are famously hostile to Rome: If the Greeks believed that Rome instituted Sunday worship, they would adopt Saturday Keeping out of pure spite. The Greeks have long memories about excommunicating the Pope in 1054 AD, and the consequent Sack of Constantinople in 1204. Pope John Paul 2 visited Athens in 2001, and the Greek Patriarch only agreed to a desultory visit after intense media pressure forced him to. The Greek government actively persecutes Roman Catholics, and has lost several appeals to the European Court of Human Rights. None of the disputes between the Eastern Church and Rome are mentioned ANYWHERE in the voluminous writings of Ellen White and Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi. That Constantinople was the capital of the Roman Empire for 1100 years is also never mentioned in their writings.
- g). Two Apostles Bartholomew and Thaddeus left Jerusalem and the borders of the Roman Empire and founded the Assyrian Church of the East and the Armenian Apostolic Church, just two years after the Resurrection. Both Apostles were martyred, and neither wrote an Epistle or a Gospel. They were never in communion with Rome and none of the laws of the Roman Empire had any effect on them, since they were located in the Assyrian Empire and the Persian Empire. Neither of these non-Roman Empires spoke Greek or Latin, the languages of the Roman Empire. Neither of these churches sent delegates to the Ecumenical Councils. Archaeologists have unearthed Christian artifacts from the First Century in China and Korea from Assyrian Church missionaries.

Both of these churches insist that they have worshiped on Sunday since they were founded, and have never kept the Sabbath. They are mentioned NOWHERE in the voluminous writings of Ellen White and Dr. Samuele Bacchiochi.

- h). There was indeed a handful of Sabbath-Keeping observant Jewish Christian converts localized around Jerusalem, but this group of early Seventh Day Adventists was extinct by 200 AD. They like Adventists rejected the Divinity of Christ; said Christ was a mere Angel; and insisted on vegetarianism and Saturday keeping as necessary for Salvation. The Ebionites as they were called were frequently denounced by Christians as heretics.
- i). Gentiles were banned from Sabbath Keeping by rulings of the Jewish Courts, which imposed the Death Penalty on Gentiles who attempted to intrude on Israel's exclusive covenant from God. The Hellenized Jews were the overwhelming majority of 1rst Century Jews that converted to Christianity, and they had jettisoned Sabbath-Keeping long before the Birth of Christ. The ferocious Greek hatred of the Sabbath and the jettisoning of the Sabbath by Hellenized Jews is well-documented in 1 Maccabees. Hellenized Jews and Gentiles were at least 95 percent of the demographic makeup of the First Century Church. They did not resume Sabbath Keeping when they converted to Christianity.

The overwhelming extrinsic evidence demonstrates that Christian Sabbath-abandonment occurred within the first year after the Resurrection, given that the two most important events of Christianity - the Resurrection and the Day of Pentecost (the "Birthday of the Church") - occurred on the First Day of the week.

"The answer to this plea came the next day, Sabbath morning, at approximately 9 o'clock am. The attackers advanced toward the church from all sides chanting "Eliminate the Tutsis!" They worked methodically with guns and machetes, moving from church to school to hospital. The victims, weak from food and water deprivation, mounted a feeble defense with bricks and stones. But they were overcome with little effort. The killers, keen to spare bullets, only paused when the physical exertion of chopping and spearing demanded rest. By evening, mop-up operations had begun: tear gas was fired to cause any living Tutsis among the corpses to cry out. The attackers then made sure these joined the rest.

In the end, Mugonero may have been the worst single massacre in the entire 1994 genocide. In a single day almost all of the 3,000 Tutsis who had gathered at the Adventist mission were slain, some 2,000 inside the Seventh-day Adventist church building itself. The bloodstains were no longer visible on the walls and floor when I visited Mugonero one week ago. The church is in fact still being used as an active place of worship. Near the entrance to the Mugonero high school there is, however, a small building with stacks of machete-hacked skulls as a memorial to what happened here more than 15 years ago.

Several months after the attack, in a short interview published in the Review, J. J. Nortey, then president of the African-Indian Ocean Division, said that as many as 99 percent of all Adventist workers in the Mugonero region—among them pastors, hospital personnel, and mission employees—were killed. In total, an estimated 10,000 Seventh-day Adventists died in Rwanda in barely three months.

Even more alarming in the aftermath of the genocide, however, is the fact that Adventists were not only among the victims. On

February 19, 2003, Pastor Ntakirutimana was sentenced by the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda to 10 years in prison for complicity in crimes against humanity. The Tribunal found that Pastor Ntakirutimana, together with his son Gerard—the head doctor at the Adventist Mugonero Hospital-aided and abetted Hutu killers, going so far as to order the removal of church roofing so that Tutsis would have nowhere to hide.

But the Ntakirutimanas were not the only Adventists who sided with the killers. In regions with large numbers of Seventh-day Adventists, the killings were just as bad as in the rest of the country. "[T]here were church-going people seen in the mobs, cheering...those who did the killings," Nortey reported. Today, jails in Rwanda hold large numbers of Adventists who have been implicated in the genocide. According to one high level church official I spoke with at the Union office in Kigali, not only Adventist lay members but numerous Adventist pastors have been convicted by Rwanda's village level gacaca courts for their role in genocidal crimes against humanity. During the genocide, he told me, some Adventists maintained their Adventism by scrupulously resting from killing on Sabbaths.

Levý reported that while traveling in war-torn Burundi (which borders Rwanda and is comprised of the same Hutu and Tutsi tribes) he asked a taxi driver to take him to the southern part of the country. The driver consented, but on one condition: the trip had to be on Saturday. "Why on Saturday?" Levý writes. "Because the 'genocidal aggressors', those Hutu of the National Liberation Front, of which the whole country continues to repeat by memory abominable crimes... they are also good Christians, mostly of Adventist confession, who don't smoke, don't drink, arrive at the villages singing loud songs and consider Saturday a sacred day, dedicated to prayer, in which one must not kill."

Subject: Statement on the observance of Sabbath

Dear Elder Orville D. Parchment (GC General Field Secretary)

I am a Samoan currently residing in Brisbane, Australia. I am a retired worker with 31 years of service to the Church and was president of the Samoa and Tokelau Mission for 14 years.

I would firstly like to express my disappointment at reading, as well as disapproval of your "STATEMENT ON THE OBSERVANCE OF SABBATH" with respect to the Sabbath in Samoa and other Pacific islands. For a church leader such as yourself, and an Assistant to the General Conference President at that, to make such a statement and publishing it for the whole world to see without a full and clear understanding of all the relevant facts is both hasty and unprofessional.

Elder Ted Wilson's article in the "Adventist World" you referred to is very clear and straight forward. I don't see why anyone would need to question the "intention" of the article, let alone try and "misuse" or "imply" what Elder Wilson had said. Elder Wilson spoke the truth and nothing but the truth on behalf of and for the World Church of Seventh-day Adventists. Saturday, as Wilson correctly stated, is the 7th Day Sabbath of creation everywhere in the world. Period!

I think it is high time for our church leaders to speak more truthfully and be more honest about where they stand with regards to the principles and core teachings upon which the SDA Church was/is founded. If they believe that Sunday can be the Seventh-day Sabbath for Adventists, then they should make that fact very clear to the World Church with sound supporting evidence for their case, and stop playing "hide-and-seek" and "pass-the-buck" as they have been doing for over two years now. Otherwise, if they are not willing to do that (i.e. state publicly their support for Sunday observance by the SDA Church) then they must stop this ridiculous Sunday keeping practice that has been allowed to exist in the Pacific for more than 120 years.

All the twists and turns, manipulations, and cover ups the South Pacific Division Office has been trying to deceive the Adventist constituency with (both in the South Pacific and abroad) do not work anymore. It may have worked in Tonga, Kiribati, and Wallis and Futuna, but not in Samoa. I have been corresponding with Dr David Tasker, Field Secretary of the SPD on behalf of the President Dr Barry Oliver, as well as with the President of the Samoa-Tokelau Mission, about this Samoan-Sabbath issue in the past. Both however have discontinued our communication – most likely reason being the lack of any theologically or logically sound reason or answer from their side to refute both the obvious flaws in their argument I pointed out, as well as the many questions I asked of them about the logic behind their Sunday-observance beliefs and practices.

In your statement you said, "They have done so in a consistent manner that has long been accepted by both the local people and the Church." It seems to me in your statement here that you are more concerned about the "consistency of the manner" as opposed to the "truth of the matter." For your information, the church in Kiribati is actually "inconsistent" with its Sabbath observance practices in that it is keeping TWO different Sabbaths because of its usage of the 180° Meridian (instead of the International Dateline) to determine its days – one side keeps Saturday, and the other keeps Sunday. The whole of Fiji on the other hand is keeping the ONE Saturday Sabbath although it too is divided by the 180° Meridian (Fiji follows and uses the International Dateline to determine its days). This doesn't sound very "consistent" to me. Furthermore, the Church in Tonga kept Sunday as the Sabbath in the early 1900s, followed by parts of Kiribati in 1995, Futuna and Wallis in

2007, and recently Samoa in 2011. Can you really call these ever-changing Sabbathkeeping practices in these different countries of the South Pacific a "consistent" practice?

May I remind you at this point that "the drawing of the dateline by national governments" does not affect or change the arrangement of days since creation. The Sabbath according to those sequence of days was affirmed by Christ Himself and His apostles in the Bible (i.e. they kept our equivalent of Saturday as the Sabbath).

All the reasons and arguments the SPD leadership and Co. provided in their various meetings with Samoan ministers in Samoa, New Zealand, and here in Australia to try and convince them (Samoan ministers) to accept their very strange policy of Sunday keeping have collapsed because they were all revealed to be full of flaws. Now these same leaders have become unusually silent with their arguments. One could only guess, but my hunch is they are hoping that this "ghost" will disappear on its own. If not, then it will be something they would rather leave for next administration to deal with. It is very unfortunate that these same leaders who have been preaching to us about the need for humility in resolving this dilemma, are the same ones who seem to lack the humility to accept their mistake in both its handling of this issue, as well as their mistake in believing the flawed and unAdventist arguments for Sunday-observance they have been propagating all along.

Finally, for you to say, "In this responsibility, the Division has the full support of the General Conference" without a full knowledge of the issues involved is, I believe, irresponsible. Let me assure you that the decision to keep Sunday as the Sabbath in Samoa was not a "local field" decision as you have said in your statement. Our people simply accepted the one-sided advice given them by the SPD delegates (which included Dr. Barry Oliver, Dr. David Tasker, and Paul Cavanagh) who travelled to Samoa to supposedly assist them in resolving the issue. Their acceptance of the advice was primarily based on our Samoan culture and practice of respecting the decision of its church leaders (on matters of faith and religion) whom they consider as God's representatives speaking on behalf of God. A decision we now know was not in line with the ways of God we as a church understand God's way to be.


The Sabbath truth therefore as Adventists interpret that truth to be is not what the SPD leadership are currently preaching, which you seem to be suggesting is supported by the GC - a point I find very strange because the President of the GC, Elder Wilson himself, clearly contradicted that in his article in "Adventist World."

I have recently returned from Samoa on an assignment to preach at a combined meeting of all faithful Seventh-day Adventists there who are observing Saturday as the 7th Day Sabbath. I will thus be continuing in my resolve to promote and strengthen this course of ours into the future because it is the Seventh-day Sabbath truth not just of the Adventist Church, but of the Bible also.

My whole ministry life and strength was given to the service of the church in Samoa because of my love for my church. I do not want my people to be deceived anymore, and possibly lose their salvation as a result, because of the bad decisions of a few proud men in leadership who refuse to show the same spirit of true humility they have been calling us to have. It is because of that concern and care for my church and my people's future that I am writing this letter.
